### THE OUTBREAK OF SMALLPOX IN LABRADOR.

OUTBREAK IS GROWING MORE SERIOUS—NEWFOUNDLAND AFRAID OF IT.

St. John's, Nfld., June 19.—The outbreak of smallpox in Canadian Labrador is growing more serious. The fisher folk on the northern coast are appealing to the colonial government to urge the Canadian ministry to prohibit intercourse between the infected locality and the remainder of the seaboard, where the ravages of smallpox would be very severe did the disease once spread to it.

## WOMAN AND HOME.

MRS. FOSTER, THE FAIR APOSTLE OF PHYSICAL CULTURE.

**Etiquette of Introductions—Wisdom in Marketing—A Woman's Impulsiveness—Admonishing Children. Bags of Perfume.**

Some years ago Mrs. William C. Foster projected among the society women of Minneapolis a physical culture club, of which she was made president. This club claims to be the only one of the kind in the country in that it is strictly non-professional. It is the out of the ordinary duty of the president to instruct the members, without one penny of pay, in the art of both physical and vocal culture. In the absence of the president the work devolves on the vice president. The club—it is called the Students' club—meets fortnightly for the training of the body. There are no papers, but a most excellent course in physical culture.

She attended the Chicago Conservatory of Oratory and because of her gifts as a reader won the personal esteem of Edwin Booth and John McCullough. Having won one of the international prizes in oratory, she has entered into the Paris Conservatory and Trinity college, Dublin, both of which she took advantage of during her recent sojourn in France and Great Britain. In appearance Mrs. Foster is attractive. She is a commanding looking brunette, with a face full of animation. As a woman of intellectual attainments she has delved deeply not only into the physical but the psychological side of her work.

“The physical depends so greatly upon the psychical,” is her declaration, “that all of the wonders wrought by careful and persistent exercising are largely due to the mental strength of the student.”

### THE GARDENER.

Root is an excellent fertilizer for plants, especially for house plants.

In taking up plants for transplanting secure all of the roots possible.

Cultivation in a dry time is most injurious to weeds and beneficial to crops.

If you desire a stocky branched graft, nip the end of the young growth after it has grown six inches or more.

To destroy ants in the lawn it is recommended to dig to the bottom of the nests and cover the bottom with coarse salt and fill in the soil again.

Mulching continuously is not advisable with any kind of fruit trees, as it draws the roots too near the surface, so that they lose their hold on the soil.

It never injures a tree or vine to cut out the dead wood at any season of the year. Dead wood may readily be seen at any time, and all such should be cut out.

Young shade trees should be trimmed into shape the first few years after setting out. The beauty of a shade tree depends upon the shape given it when young.

Too many apple trees are too full of twigs and small limbs. They form a dense mass that the sun and air cannot penetrate. Such trees seldom blossom in the center, and if they do the fruit rarely matures.

## THE WORLD OVER.
