**THE KING SERIOUSLY ILL.**

**Coronation Ceremony had to be Postponed.**

LONDON, 12 29 p. m.—The Coronation has been postponed indefinitely on account of the indisposition of King Edward.

12.40 p. m.—King Edward is suffering from perityphlitis, and is undergoing a surgical operation.

12.46 p. m.—Sir Francis Knollys, the King's private physician, issued the official medical report as follows:

The King is suffering from perityphlitis. His condition on Saturday was so satisfactory that it was hoped His Majesty would be able to go through the ceremony. On Monday evening a recurrence became manifest, rendering a surgical operation necessary to-day.

"The operation has been successfully performed. A large abscess has been evacuated. The King has borne the operation well and is in a very satisfactory condition."

Dr. Hannay, of St. John, is among those mentioned for the position of Dominion archivist, held by the late Dr. Brynner.

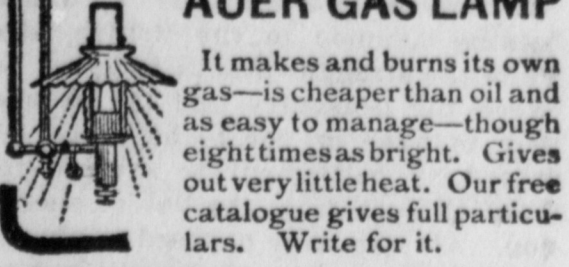
