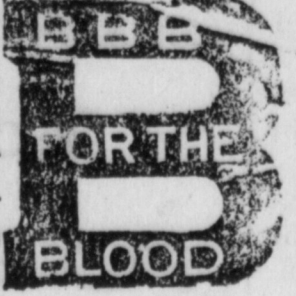

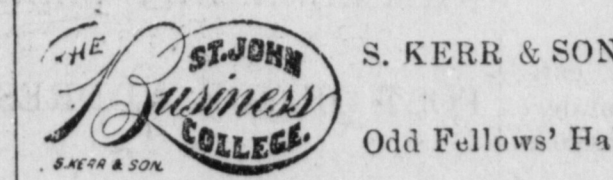

—We are in receipt of a very handsome calendar from the Intercolonial Railway. It is of unique design and shows the route traversed by that railway.

—The municipal council meets in the court house next Tuesday. There are quite a number of new councillors this year and no doubt considerable business will be transacted.

—This being the week of prayer, services were held in the Methodist Church on Tuesday evening, the Presbyterian Church on Thursday evening and the Episcopal Church on Friday evening. All the services were largely attended.

—Parties have been quite plentiful of late. Miss Lulu Robertson entertained a number of her young friends on Friday evening and Miss Mamie Murray did likewise on Monday evening. There were several others during the past week.

—Smelt fishermen are at last favored with weather suitable for their business. The last week or so has been just what they have been wanting, and the majority of them are doing fairly well. Some good catches were made last week. The price has been raised to two cents per pound.

—The Department of Public Works, Ottawa, are calling for tenders for the construction of an extension of the breakwater at the north beach, Richibucto harbor. The plan and specifications can be seen at the post office here. Each tender must be accompanied by an accepted bank check for \$2,500.

—One fare rates will be made on all railways to those who wish to attend the annual meeting of the Farmers' and Dairy-men's Association at Fredericton on the 28th, 29th and 30th inst. On the Intercolonial and Canadian Pacific the tickets will be upon the Standard Certificate plan, i. e., when buying a ticket for Fredericton, purchasers will ask the agent for Standard Certificate; this certificate when stamped at the meeting will entitle the holder to ticket from Fredericton back to his starting point.

—The Chatham World says: A small-pox scare was the sensation of New Year's Day in town. A child in the janitor's apartments of the Dominion building had a rash, and two physicians thought so strongly that it might be smallpox that the rooms were quarantined, and one of the entrances to the building closed. The alarm in many homes was great, and mail matter was looked at with terror. Dr. Lunan was sent for, and on Thursday pronounced it to be only an infantile rash. The town breathes again.

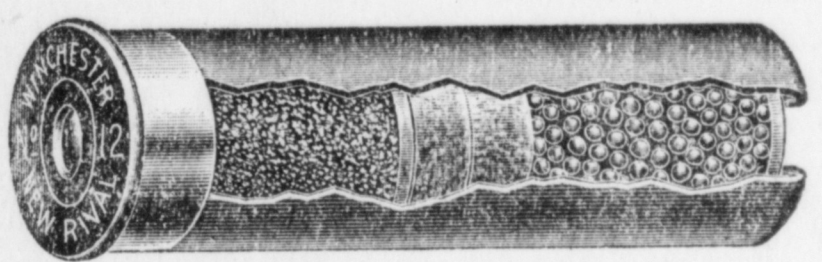
