MR. RICHARDSON HEARD FROM.

To the Municipality of the County of Kent:

The writer wishes to say a few words to the ratepayers and their representatives in Council assembled in reference to his application for the vacancy in the office of Secretary made by the removal of Mr. McInerney to the city of St. John. I may say with regard to Mr. McInerney that he has most ably conducted the business of the County and his loss will be deeply deplored and his position hard to fill.

His departure is greatly regretted by all and it is to be hoped (and no doubt he will) that he will distinguish himself as much in his new field of labor as he has done while representing the county in the Dominion Parliament. At the time of his election I was one of his supporters and have had no reason to regret that I gave him my support.

I may say that in the course of my life time, I have given a considerable portion of it to politics. I took a very great interest in the agitation for the Southern Railway and spent the greater part of my time and means in endeavoring to get the Railway by that route and never abandoned the agitation for the Shediac route until it was made manifest that the subsidy must go to the Kent Northern or no Railway at all.

Indeed the granting of the subsidy to that road did not deter me from endeavoring to meet the Railway views of the Southern people.

Finding that the influence of the Shediac men was insufficient to obtain the connection at that point, I wrote to Messrs. Harris, Killam and others at Moncton and endeavored and successfully interested them in the Southern railway.

With Moncton as the objective point, they consented to take the matter up, and I drafted the bill for the construction of the Moncton & Buctouche road and it was put through the House of Assembly and the construction of the Moncton & Buctouche Road was the result.

I had afterwards the pleasure of being present when the first sod was turned, an event which will no doubt be long remembered by the numerous gentlemen of the Southern parishes of the county, who with myself had so long and ably assisted in the agitation for the Southern route.

Without going further into detail I may say that there was scarcely an election out my services were in demand. I assisted actively at the election of the following members of parliament and assembly viz. Messrs. Cutler, Landry, McInerney and White, and Messrs. DesBrisay, Sayre, White, Johnson, Girouard, Barnes, McLeod, Wheten and the Legeres, and Mr. Brait although unsuccessful, also received my support as also did Mr. Pihoney. Indeed when these gentlemen offered I had a strong inclination to run myself, but at their request and urgent solicitation I retired and gave place to them.

It will thus be seen that I have not been idle in my time so far as the politics of

the county are concerned and I hope I will not be considered as asking too much of the hands of the county when I ask the municipality to elect me for one or two terms at any rate to the position of the Secretary, a position I should feel it an honor to fill and to what I would bring all by ability to bear.
