Selenium. Selenium, one of the cheapest of the rare metals, is worth \$22 a pound. American Pine. American pine when green weighs 44 pounds 12 ounces to the cubic foot. When seasoned, its weight is reduced to 30 pounds 11 ounces.

The governor general presided over the first annual convention of the Society for the Prevention of Tuberculosis at Ottawa Thursday. His Excellency said they wished to arouse the public interest in the prevention of tuberculosis and then, by collecting the best opinions and disseminating them, to give instruction in simple means of prevention which ordinary care renders feasible. The speaker of the evening was Dr. Knopf, the celebrated specialist in New York, who pointed out that Canada was away a head of the United States in this respect as the States has not yet a national organization for the prevention of the disease. The principal preventive to be used was the increasing of knowledge among the people in order that they might take ordinary measure to prevent the disease originating.

A meeting of the Butchers' Association, held in London Thursday, unanimously petitioned parliament to remove the existing restrictions on the importation of cattle from Canada and Argentina. They declared the action they petitioned was imperative in order to prevent a meat famine during the coronation of the King. K. W. Hanbury, president of the Board of Agriculture, said the government had no reason to apprehend a serious meat shortage, and that it could not entertain a proposal to remit the restrictions on cattle imported from Canada.
