DOMINION NEWS.

The Canadian banking statement for January shows a large gain in deposits and in discounts over the same month of last year. The note circulation has grown from \$45,025,306 to \$48,586,529. The deposits by the public payable on demand in Canada are larger by \$1,875,453 than one year ago. The deposits payable after notice or on a fixed day in Canada have expanded by \$32,973,123. There is a gain of \$10,810,071 on deposits outside of Canada. Call and short loans on stocks and bonds in Canada, \$4,829,285; call and short loans elsewhere than in Canada, \$15,351,979; current loans in Canada, \$13,623,735, and current loans elsewhere than in Canada, \$8,685,416.

Senator W. D. Perley, Wolseley, N. W. T., spent Saturday in Kingston, Ont., addressing the students of the dairy school. While there he engaged Mr. Robert Graham, in attendance at the school, as butter maker of his Western creamery.

Suit for \$199,362 in succession duties has been begun by the Ontario government against the estate of the late United States Senator Henry Payne, of Cleveland, Ohio, who died in 1896 leaving property in Ontario valued at \$2,987,248.

The prohibition convention, at a meeting in Toronto on Tuesday, adopted resolutions against accepting R. J. S. measure as a fulfilment of the government's pledge, also that the date fixed for the vote is inconvenient, and asking the government to remove the objectionable features of the measure.

The civic finance committee of Montreal has decided to call for tenders for a \$2,000,000 loan, part of which is to meet maturing indebtedness.

The organization of the Atlantic Pulp and Paper Company, which has been going on for some months, has been completed. The capital is \$3,000,000. The purposes of the company are to acquire the limits, water power, saw mills, etc., of the New Richmond, on the north side of the Bay of Chaleur, in the county of Bonaventure, Que., and to erect mills for the manufacture of pulp and paper. The property contains more than 300 square miles of almost virgin forest, principally spruce. The company proposes to furnish a plant with a capacity of turning out more than 22,000 tons of newspaper print a year, which will be able to sell at the rate of a little more than \$1.80 per 100 pounds. The present price of newspaper print is about \$2.50 per 100 pounds.

The Ontario legislature has granted the privilege to the Ontario Ship and Railway Company to construct a line direct from Toronto to Collingwood. This is thirty-three miles shorter than the Grand Trunk route. The object of the line is to intercept the passage of part of the grain traffic destined for the port of Quebec.

At a meeting of the War Eagle Mining Company's stockholders at Toronto, Tuesday, it was announced that the company owed the Bank of Toronto \$256,171 and George Gooderham \$385,347. It was decided to give Gooderham a mortgage of \$62,500 and to borrow \$200,000 to develop the mine down to 1,450 feet.

The Northwest Cattle Company, of Montreal, has sold its great ranch to Gordon and Ironsides, the Fares Company, and Geo. Lane, the consideration being somewhat over \$200,000.

The Dominion Alliance of Manitoba has asked the Lieutenant Governor to veto the bill introduced in the Manitoba legislature for the purpose of holding a referendum on the prohibition question.

The street railwaymen's union at Kingston has disbanded. The strike headquarters in the United States refused to pay the men the money they were entitled to draw while out on strike. Recently the men paid their assessment for the St. Louis strike and are indignant because they were not treated as well.

The Montreal street railway directors have decided to issue \$1,500,000 4 1/2 per cent. second mortgage bonds to shareholders on record up to April 15 at par for each eight shares of stock. This is to pay for the Montreal park and island system.

Early Thursday morning Isadore Turcot, veterinary surgeon, Montreal, threw a lighted lamp at his wife and her clothes took fire. She was so badly burned she will likely die. Turcot then took a dose of carbolic acid and crawled into the garret. Upon being found by the police he was taken to the police station, where he soon died. Turcot went home last night intoxicated, and on awakening this morning commenced quarrelling with his wife and ended the argument as above described.

Lacroix, the wife murderer, after eight days' fasting, partook of a good square meal on Thursday.

Rev. Dr. Laing of Dundas, ex-moderator of the general assembly and one of the most prominent Presbyterian ministers in Ontario, died at the general hospital here Thursday, as a result of an operation for kidney trouble. Dr. Laing was in his 74th year and was a native of Tarbet, Ross-shire, Scotland.

Hon. E. G. Prior, who has been sworn in as minister of mines, will oppose E. V. Godwell in Victoria.

TRUBLE OF ROYALTY

KING LEOPOLD HAS A BAD THROAT AND QUEEN WILHELMINA IS ILL.

THE HAGUE, Feb. 27.—Sensational rumors are in circulation to the effect that the States-General will be convoked for the purpose of appointing a regent for a year, owing to the illness of Queen Wilhelmina, who is going abroad.

BRUSSELS, Feb. 27.—It is learned that there is considerable anxiety over the condition of King Leopold's throat. His recent Mediterranean trip resulted in no benefit. The greatest precautions have been taken to prevent complications. On account of his advanced years—he will be 67 if he lives until April 9—and irregular life he has led, his intimates fear the King to be near his end.

MAY BE REPRESENTED AT THE CORONATION.

CLAIMS OF COLONIAL VOLUNTEERS WHO FOUGHT IN SOUTH AFRICA.

TORONTO, Feb. 27.—The Telegram's special cable from London says: "In the house of commons to-day St. John Brodrick, under secretary for war, in reply to Mr. McLaren, Liberal member for Bosworth, said the claims of representative detachments of colonial volunteers who fought in South Africa to attend the coronation and take part in parades incidental thereto were being considered.

"It is not probable that the matter of Lord Dundonald's appointment as general officer commanding the Canadian militia will be considered by that officer until after the funeral of the dowager countess and the arrangement of family affairs subsequently.

THE WORLD OVER.

Saco, Me., schools are to be closed on account of the prevalence of small pox.

The Secretary of the Admiralty, Mr. Arnold Foster, in the House of Commons, Tuesday, said that at the approaching colonial conference in London occasion would be taken to ascertain the views of the colonies on the question of contributions to the strength of the British navy.

The government was defeated in the House of Commons Tuesday night. Capt. Norton (Liberal) called attention to the excessive hours of labor imposed upon railroad men, and moved that the government be empowered to demand returns from the railroad companies of the hours exceeding twelve per day their servants were obliged to work. After some debate, which was directed towards showing accidents arose from overwork on the part of the railway employes, Gerald Balfour (Conservative), on behalf of the government, admitted that there was some justification for the motion and that he was willing to accept a modified form thereof, but the House carried Capt. Norton's original motion by 155 votes to 154 amid loud cheers from the opposition.
