—Brigantine Aquili arrived in port Tuesday.

—Two young men, Higgins and Goodspeed, were arrested at Vanceboro Saturday for the murder of young Doherty in St. John.

—W. H. Dickie has rented the blacksmith shop of the late Milton O'Brien and is prepared to attend to the wants of the public in blacksmith work.

—Elzear J. LeBlanc has had the house in Buctouche in which he has kept his store since the fire, moved to his lot facing the Buctouche Bridge.

—The coronation of King Edward took place Saturday but with the ceremonies and celebrations very much curtailed. The health of the king continues to improve.

—The household effects of the late Mrs. Miller will be held at public auction at the Miller building, Richibucto, on Saturday, August 23rd, commencing at one o'clock in the afternoon. J. D. McMinn, auctioneer.

—The rain on Thursday last prevented the Episcopal Sunday School picnic. Next day however, was a fine day and a large number attended and spent a very pleasant day. It was held at Graham's grove across the river.

—Judgment was given at Fredericton last Friday in the case of Allen, Executrix, vs. Shehyn. This was a case arising out of the U. Babineau failure at St. Louis. It was tried at the last March Circuit in St. John and a verdict found for the plaintiff. Non-suit refused.

—We would call the attention of our readers to the announcement in another column that the Rev. J. Balfour Smith, B. D., of New York City will preach in the Methodist church, Richibucto next Sabbath morning. Rev. Mr. Smith is on a short visit to his sister, Mrs. (Rev.) H. R. Baker, wife of the Methodist clergyman of this town.

—The St. Andrews Beacon says: "Wm. Brodie has been appointed head master of the St. John High School. This is one of the best educational positions in the province. Mr. Brodie is to be congratulated upon his advancement—likewise the people of St. John." Mr. Brodie is a nephew of Mr. J. C. Ross of Buctouche, and taught the Superior school in Buctouche a few years ago.

—The case of LeBlanc vs. The Commercial Union Assurance Company was decided by the Supreme Court at Fredericton on Friday last. There was an action brought to recover on a policy of insurance on plaintiff's premises in Buctouche burned in the last Buctouche fire. It was tried at the March Circuit here and verdict entered for plaintiff. Verdict set aside and a non suit entered, Judges Landry and McLeod dissenting.

—A meeting of the council of the Barristers' Society was held in the supreme court chambers, Fredericton, on Thursday evening, those present being J. D. Hazen, John B. M. Baxter, Geo. W. Allen, A. B. Connell, J. D. Phinney, A. J. Gregory and T. Carleton Allen. It was decided, among other things, to have law examinations in future conducted by a board composed of three members of the society. Messrs. G. W. Allen, Baxter and Phinney were appointed for the present year.

—Rev. Wm. R. Robinson, who was stationed at Kouchibouguac for several years, is now pastor of the Baptist church, Marysville, York County, and is a leading member of the committee to enforce the Scott Act in that county. He has laid complaints against several of the hotel keepers in Fredericton and promises to make it hot for several more. He is meeting, however, with the usual reluctance on the part of witnesses to appear for the prosecution and none of the cases have thus far reached a conclusion.

—A case of assault and battery tried before the Stipendiary Magistrate of Buctouche on Tuesday of last week attracted much attention in that locality. One Cyril Jailet claimed that a man named LeBlanc had assaulted and beaten him and his face bore marks of hard usage. It was claimed however that Jailet had provoked the assault and had made insulting remarks about LeBlanc's wife. The Magistrate found that Jailet was to blame in the matter and he dismissed the complaint. Neither party was represented by counsel.

Death's Harvest.

Death of Hazen Crawford of Coagne.

BROOKLYN, N. Y., Aug. 5.—Mr. Hazen Crawford of 173 Devoe St., Brooklyn, N. Y., met with a sad accident in that city on Saturday last which ultimately resulted in his death.

He was crossing Manhattan Ave. with a friend during the afternoon a trolley car came along at a good speed and before he could get out of the way one of the wheels passed over his right foot, crushing it so badly that it was deemed necessary by the doctors at the Eastern district Hospital, to which he was taken, to have it amputated just above the ankle. The operation was successful and his chances for recovery were considered good till Monday noon when gangrene set in, and although every effort was done to save the unfortunate man, he died about 11.30 Monday night.

Mr. Crawford was the youngest son of the late Wm. Crawford of Coagne River, Kent Co., N. B., and had been in different parts of the States for the past four years, finally locating in Brooklyn with his brother George, making his home with his sister, Mrs. Geo. Hope, of 173 Devoe St. The deceased was only 24 years of age. He was a fine specimen of manhood, strong, healthy, sober and industrious, and was employed with a Brooklyn construction company. He was a member of the Foresters, was also connected with several Trade Unions of Brooklyn, among all of which he was very popular. His brother Wm. John came on from Chicago to attend the funeral which will take place Thursday afternoon at Cypress Hill Cemetery, Brooklyn.

The death of Flora, relict of the late Lauchlin McLean, occurred at her home in McLean Settlement on Friday morning, August 1st. She had been sick for some time and her death was not unexpected. She was a native of Cape Breton. Deceased was 65 years of age. She leaves surviving a large family to mourn the loss of a kind and loving mother. The funeral, which took place on Sunday morning, 10 a. m. at Coatesville, was largely attended. Rev. J. Wheeler, of Harcourt preached a very appropriate sermon at the house. Dr. King officiated at the grave. The pallbearers were J. McDonald, L. McPherson, A. McLean, F. McLead, G. Colbourne, E. Reid. The family have the sympathy of the whole community in their sad bereavement.

Goodspeed Swears Higgins Killed Doherty.
