The King had a long conversation with J. Pierpont Morgan.

The double storm that struck Peoria, Ill., last week, was the worst Central Illinois has experienced since 1843. Rain fell in torrents, and the damage caused by the high winds cannot be estimated at this time. Probably the worst damage in proportion to the size of the town was at Kingston Mines, a small mining town twenty miles below Peoria. There three people were killed outright and ten were injured, three fatally. Thirteen locomotives owned by the Illinois Central, two by the Iowa Central, four by the Toledo, Peoria & Western, and five by the Big Four were almost totally destroyed.

### MARITIME PROVINCE NOTES.

The large saw mill containing a rotary and shingle machines, owned by James McNair and situated at Red Rapids, twelve miles up the Tobique river, was destroyed by fire Wednesday morning. It is thought that, dreading he might become a burden on his friends, he took his life.

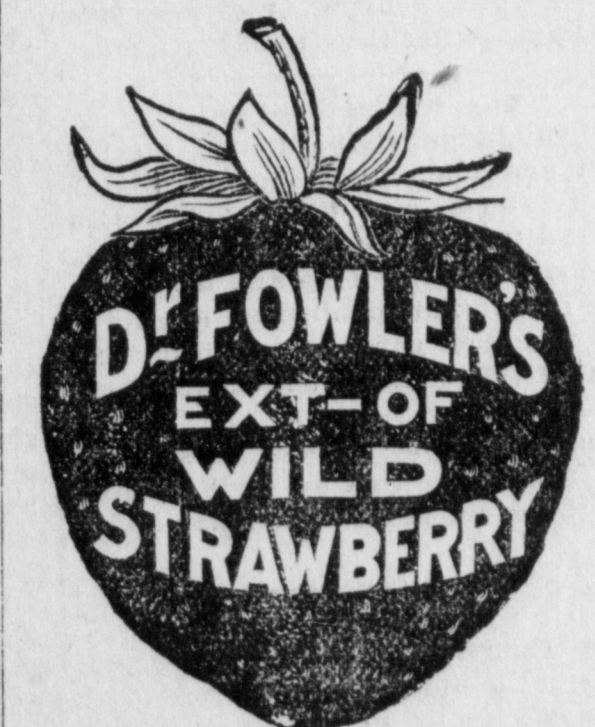

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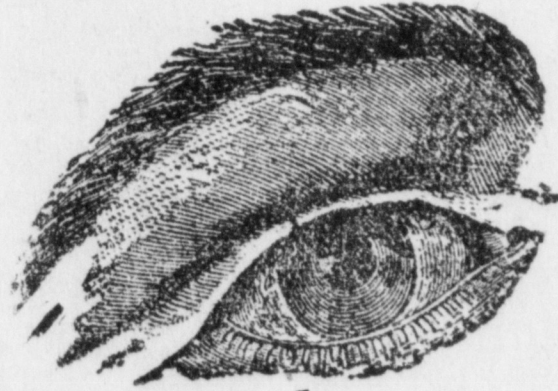
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
