known to go with smallpox. Again, Dr. King, of Buctouche, after making a careful examination, declared that it was not smallpox, and Dr. Landry, who was sent by the Board of Health, would not take it upon himself to contradict this. Dr.

LeBlanc, of Cape Bauld, who examined the patient at a safe distance and by lamplight called it smallpox and so the district was quarantined. Now, as there are no new cases, Dr. King's theory seems to be probable, and the machinery should be set in motion to liberate the place as soon as possible.


