**NOTRE DAME.**

JUNE 16.—The death occurred on Saturday, 7th inst., of Matilda Grady, relict of the late Martin Grady, who died two years ago. Mrs. Grady was a long time ill with consumption and her death was not unexpected. Her life was probably prolonged by the tender care and careful nursing of her two daughters, who, day and night, were constantly at her bedside to gratify her slightest wish and minister to her comfort. Her husband, Martin Grady, came from the South of Ireland when 18 years of age and was married at Shediac, taking up his residence here and remaining till his death. Mrs. Grady was the mother of 12 children, all of whom are living namely: Mrs. J. Carroll, Annie, Maggie, Etta, Blanche, John and Joseph Grady who reside in Notre Dame; Mrs. M. Marston, Stasia, Alpha and Thomas Grady, of Boston; Wm. Grady of Oysterville, Mass. On account of a supposed case of small pox in the house the neighbors and relatives were not allowed to attend the funeral, which took place Monday morning at 10 o'clock. The bereaved family feel keenly the loss of their mother, coming as it does so soon after the death of their father, coupled with the sad circumstances surrounding the funeral which debarred them from following the remains to the grave. Mrs. Grady was 57 years of age, and was a native of Prince Edward Island.

Mrs. Edward Govang died at the residence of her father, Peter Richard, Wednesday, 11th, inst., of consumption, and was buried Friday morning. She was but 22 years of age and was married only 4 months.

The smallpox situation is unchanged. The roads leading in every direction are still barricaded and guarded night and day so that none can come into or leave the district. As there have been no new cases for more than a week, and those who came in direct contact or even those living in the same house have not contracted the disease, people are beginning to clamor for the fences to be removed from the roads and allow intercourse with the outside world. The precautions which were necessary at the discovery of the sickness are now looked upon as an imposition, and if justice were done should be removed at once. Those who contracted the disease were not at any time sick, merely being covered with a rash which was not itchy or painful, and there was an absence of all the symptoms which are known to go with smallpox. Again, Dr. King, of Buctouche, after making a careful examination, declared that it was not smallpox, and Dr. Landry, who was sent by the Board of Health, would not take it upon himself to contradict this. Dr. LeBlanc, of Cape Bauld, who examined the patient at a safe distance and by lamp-light called it smallpox and so the district was quarantined. Now, as there are no new cases, Dr. King's theory seems to be probable, and the machinery should be set in motion to liberate the place as soon as possible.

The mother then flung herself into the rushing river.
