PROPOSED LEGISLATION RE SO-CALLED WOOLLEN GOODS.

With this object in view, the Hon. Chas. H. Grosvenor, at the request of the National Live Stock Association, recently introduced into the House of Representatives of the United States, a bill to provide for federal inspection of mixed goods and the proper marking of the same, which is known as H. R. 6565. The purpose of this Bill is to make it possible for the consumer to know what he is purchasing by having the goods stamped so as to indicate whether it is allwool, or if not, then the percentage of shoddy or waste. There is no objection made to the use of cotton waste, mango, shoddy, &c., &c., in the manufacture of textile fabrics, when the fact is made known to the consumer, and where fraud is not perpetrated by selling these mixtures as all-wool fabrics.

As an epitome of the measure, the following is extracted: "All manufacturers of goods or fabrics of any kind whatsoever made in imitation of woollen goods or fabrics, or goods which when so made are calculated or intended to be sold as woollens or woollen goods, not made wholly of new or unused sheep's wool, shall so mark, label, or tag such goods, as that they may be readily distinguished from genuine wools or woollens, as defined in the first section of this Act. That such mark, label or tag shall be so attached to such goods or fabric so that it cannot be detached except by design; and such label shall accurately state in plain printed letters or figures the constituent fibres or other materials or substances of which it is composed, or the relative proportion per cent. of each." The penalty for non-compliance with the provisions of the proposed law are thus set forth:—

"That any manufacturer, merchant, importer, or other person who shall wilfully recklessly, or carelessly mark incorrectly any cloths, goods or fabrics, or any article manufactured, or in the process of manufacture therefrom, required by this Act to be labelled or marked, so as to show a larger per cent. of wool or a smaller per cent. of shoddy or cheaper fibre or material, in any manner than will, or is calculated to, deceive or mislead the purchaser thereof, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be fined not less than \$50.00, and not more than \$5,000.00 for each offence."

The National Live Stock Association points out that "There are several classes of shoddy. The best is made from the sweepings of tailor shops, and the emptyings of ragbags in civilized countries. The worst, which constitutes the greater part used in America, is from the rotten cast off rags of beggars and the lazar and pest houses of Europe, having in them all kinds and amounts of filth and disease. These are gathered by rag-pickers from the slums and alleys and sent to America in shiploads, where they are purchased by a certain class of manufacturers, who, in order to take the curse off the name, term the stuff "re used wool fibre." It must be remembered however, that in most instances, when tearing this shoddy to pieces, preparatory to again weaving it into cloth, it is found to be so rotten and dead, that nothing is produced but dust, and in order to get two ends, so that it can be spun, a minimum piece of wool or cotton is mixed with it, in order that it may be held together. The next step after weaving carries it to unscrupulous dealers, who sell this production to the laboring men,

and in fact to all classes of society, for "pure wool," thus getting for a suit worth three or four dollars, more than three times this amount. To encourage such a fraud, is simply putting the lousy rags of European paupers in competition with the sheep and wool growers of America and elsewhere, and robbing the consumers who wear woollen garments by selling them the stuff under a misrepresentation. If the foregoing statements are facts, and it is scarcely likely the Live Stock Association would publicly state them unless they were true. It can be readily seen that, apart from the fraud and misrepresentation in the matter, there is a considerable source of danger to the public health through infection.

It will, I believe, be readily admitted that some shoddy is better than many low grade wools, and when made into cloth, would make a better article than the short staple low grade wool; but this is one of the anomalies one has to contend with, and should not be a stumbling block to legislation on the question. Sreuous efforts will no doubt be made in all countries where legislation is proposed to prevent the consideration of the subject; but the difficulties in the way of formulating a workable enactment cannot be unmountable, and I sincerely hope that this paper may do something to hasten the object we have in view.

ROOSEVELT IN PERIL.

Electric Car Struck His Drag.

President Bruised, One Man Killed Several Injured.

PITTSFIELD, MASS., Sept. 3.—The drag containing President Roosevelt and party driving from Pittsfield to Lenox, according to a message received by telephone from the Country Club, was hit by an electric car near there. The horses attached to the carriage were killed and several of the party injured.

The President escaped with a few bruises, his face being badly scratched, Secret Service Agent Craig is reported killed, and D. J. Pratt, the driver of the President's coach, had his skull fractured.

The injured are being brought to this city in ambulances.

A later report from the Country Club says that the motorman of the car is also dead.

Later reports state that the motorman, Madden, of the electric car, was not killed. Secret Service Agent Craig was the only one to lose his life. Secretary Cortelyou was somewhat cut and bruised.

Motorman Madden and the conductor were placed under arrest.

THE QUESTION OF GOVERNING THE PHILIPPINES.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 5.—Upon recommendation of General Chaffee, concurred in by General Davis, who is to be his successor in the Philippines, an order was issued to-day by the war department arranging the Philippines into three departments. The department of Luzon is to be commanded by Gen. James F. Wade, the department of Vizayas to be commanded by Gen. T. J. Wix, and the department of Mindanao to be commanded by Brig. Gen. Samuel S. Sumner.

CAPE OFFICIAL'S CRIME.

SENT A SECRET CODE BOOK TO MR STEYN.

NEW YORK, SEPT. 2.—In his speech in the Cape Colony Parliament, the Cape Town correspondent of The Times, ex-Colonial Secretary J. W. Sauer delivered a scathing tirade against the loyal Dutch, who, he alleged, deserted their own people and deserved all they suffered. Dr. T. W. Smart, ex-Commissioner of Public Works, replying, repudiated the attempts made on the other side of the House to represent the rebellion as the result of martial law instead of vice versa.

In a later despatch the correspondent says that as a result of grave charges brought by innuendo against Mr Tewater, an official, by Dr. Smart, Mr. Merriman moved the adjournment of the House. Dr. Smart thereupon made a definite charge that Mr. Tewater, at the outbreak of the Boer war, sent a secret Ministerial code book, of which there were only three copies, to Mr. Steyn at Bloemfontein, where it was subsequently found.

THANKSGIVING MAY BE OCTOBER 23RD.

OTTAWA, Sept. 6.—Strong representations are being made to the Government in favor of having Thanksgiving Day brought on early this fall, and it is not impossible that October 23rd may be the date chosen. The shipping interests do not like to have the canals closed down for a day till their last consignments are rushed through but in this year of grace Canada has been so exceptionally blessed of providence that many urge a day of rejoicing should be fixed before the weather becomes so raw and inclement as to give one the blues, however uplifted one's soul ought to be for the blessing of continued prosperity.

WILL BE AT SUSSEX CAMP THIS WEEK.

OTTAWA, Sept. 6.—Lord Dundonald will leave on Sunday next to attend the camp at Sussex, New Brunswick, which opens on Sept. 9th. While away he will inspect all the different schools. A band consisting of one bandmaster and twenty-four bandmen is authorized for the divisional camps at Sussex, Three Rivers and Niagara-on-the-Lake, in addition to the strength already detailed.

Some of the striking Welsh miners have gone back to the collieries.

The London Standard announces that a steel trust is in process of formation among the English steel manufactures.

Eighteen vessels were driven ashore in a gale at Port Elizabeth, South Africa. It is feared there has been great loss of life.

In London, the Boer generals are credited with the intention of asking for \$8,000,000 for farm rebuilding and restocking. The amount originally agreed upon under the terms of surrender was £3,000,000.

A despatch from Pretoria, states that the reports of bad feeling between the National Scouts and the surrendered Boers have been exaggerated, and that these with the returning prisoners of war are settling down with very little wrangling.

DOMINION NEWS.

Ottawa has a second case of smallpox. Laura Laplante of St. Thomas de Alfred. Count Esterhazy of New York is in Ottawa to promote emigration from Hungary.

A new mine opened near Palmer's Rapids, Ont., by John Donnelly contains a large deposit of rich corundum.

A despatch from Ottawa states that Sir Wilfrid Laurier was offered a peerage at the time of the coronation and declined it.

Mr. Timothy Kelcher, a farmer from near Guelph, was dragged over the dashboard by a runaway team and badly injured.

The Reception Committee of the Ottawa City Council passed a resolution of indignation condemning the authorities who kept them from enjoying reserved seats at the review of the Albany Guards and the Hong Kong contingent, held by Lord Minto on Parliament Hill on Monday.

Customs collections in Winnipeg for August \$165,853.

During August there were 175 deaths and 115 births in Winnipeg.

The C. P. R. land sales for August, 1902 were more than double what they were last year.

The Canadian Pacific Railway is now ready to move 500,000 bushels of wheat daily to lake ports.

Sir Mackenzie Bowell, Senator Kirchoffer and Mr. H. A. Ward, M. P., of East Durham, are at Lake Winnipegosis duck shooting.

Howard S. Folger denies that the New York Central Railway has purchased the boats of the Thousand Islands Steamboat Company. He admits that the matter has been discussed by the officers of the railroad during the summer.

Mrs. Samkin, a Montreal widow has sued Chano Workin for \$2,000 for breach of promise, and had him locked up to prevent him leaving the States.

The church of England synod opened its third quadrennial session on Wednesday, and Bible teaching in schools was recommended.

George King, a Hamilton painter stabbed his son William during a family quarrel on Sunday morning, and the son may die.

A McKillop and Son's flour mill and bending factory and the electric works at West Lorne, Ont., were destroyed by fire. The loss was over \$30,000.

In London, Colborne Griffith's milk wagon was struck by a trolley car and demolished, and the horse killed but the driver escaped without injury.

At Guelph, Ont., on Sunday, Chas. Redmond, a retired farmer, residing on Durham street, took half a cup full of Paris green, from the effects of which he died.

This is the second ascent of the famous peak by a woman, Mrs. Birus, an English woman, having climbed it last season.
