
The Chronicle in an editorial on this despatch says:

The Hague correspondent of the London Daily Mail declares that Dr. Leyds, the European representative of the Transvaal, is apparently attempting to draw Mr. Chamberlain, the British colonial secretary, to disclose the terms conditional upon the waiving of independence.

John F. Barlow, Liberal member for Frome, in the House of Commons Tuesday asked whether those colonies which have expended money at the request and on account of the War office have charged commission, and if so, at what rate per cent., and if it was the intention of the government to pay such commission? St. John Brodrick replied that the usual commission of 3 per cent. on local expenditure in connection with the raising and equipping of contingents furnished for South Africa would be allowed to the colonies by the Imperial government.
