NEW YORK, May 13.-President Schwab of the United States Steel Corporation reports that for the past year there were 13,326,705 tons of ore mined; 9,079,142 tons of coke manufactured and 7,152,121 tons furnace product, or 45 per cent of the total production of the United States.

The manufacturing cost of the steel properties of the corporation's transporta . ion properties, selling value, was \$29,-511,012; operating expenses, and taxes, and manufacturing cost, \$16,431,006. The outlay for repairs, maintenance and extraordinary renewals during the year was: Steel making properties. \$19,208,-335, coke making properties, \$881,763; transportation properties, \$4,451,590; total, \$24,541,688. The average number of employes was 158,263, and the total wages paid \$112,829 198

As you walk along certain parts of Paris your attention is sometimes attracted by the barking of a dog, and on such an occasion one of the queerest of the outdoor trades of Paris is seen. Near the water's edge, his black coat flecked thickly with soapsuds. stands the dog, and over him, energetically shampooing the soap into the long, hairy coat, stands one of the professional dog washers who haunt the banks of the Seine at stated spots from the Pont d'Iena to the Pont Neuf. These men lather and wash pet dogs while their owners look on from comveniently placed chairs. The fees range from 5 sous to a franc. When the soaping operation is completed, the dog is dropped into the river and encouraged to get rid of the dirt and soap by a
