St. Augustine in his "Confessions" relates how he once suffered from "dolor dentium" (toothache), apparently in an aggravated form, for he could not speak. In consequence she became toothache's tutelary saint, as her emblems— one of which is "holding a tooth in pinchers"—sufficiently testify.



They complain that the defendants commenced to infringe their patent some two years ago.
