The Legislature.

FREDERICTON, March 18th.-In the legislature to-day Mr. Copp introduced a petition for the passage of an act to amend the pedlars act.
Bills were introduced authorizing the school trustees of Chatham to issue debentures to incorporate the Chipman memorial hospital, to authorize St. Stephen to issue debentures. To authorize St. Stephen to assess in aid of the Chipman hospital and to authorize St. Stephen to aid the Maritime Edge Tool company.
The bill respecting investments by trustees was considered in committee. The object of the bill is to declare in what securities trust monies can be invested so as to relieve trustees of liability.
The bill will be further considered to-morrow.
Owing to the absence of Lieutenant Governor and of the leaders of the opposition the consideration of supply which was to have been taken up to-day was postponed until to-morrow.
