The ice harvest was fairly well gathered in during the past week. A. & R. Loggie and R. O'Leary have each about one thousand tons stored away for the fresh fish business of the summer months. A number of citizens have been getting in a supply for their own use.

It is generally reported that Fred B. Edgcombe will be the government candidate for the house of assembly to fill the vacancy created by the elevation of F. P. Thompson to the senate. The opposition have not announced their candidate. It is said the election will be brought on at once.

Word has reached here of a death under very sad circumstances. Miss Geraldine Buckley, of Rogersville, who had been attending the convent at Newcastle took pneumonia while at the convent and died there. The remains were brought to Rogersville on Monday for interment. The deceased was only thirteen years of age.

At a sitting of the Kent County Probate Court before Judge H. H. James on Monday last, letters of administration of the estate of the late Mrs. Robert Law, were granted to Alice M. Law, daughter of deceased. Letters of guardianship of the minor children of Mr. and Mrs. Law were also granted to Alice M. Law; Wm. D. Carter, Proctor for petitioner.

Mr. E. T. P. Shewen is back to his old office in the engineer department at St. John, the federal government having reinstated him. The government decided to divide the province in two divisions. Mr. Geo. E. Day will take charge of all the work in the counties of Restigouche, Gloucester, Northumberland, Kent and Westmorland, while Mr. Shewen will look after the remaining counties.

A Fredericton despatch says: "R. S. Barker, formerly secretary to Lieut. Governor McClellan, has been appointed private secretary to Lieut. Governor Snowball. The salary attached is about \$500 a year. It is understood that Lieut. Colonel Call, of Newcastle and Lieut. Col. McLean, 62nd Regt., St. John, will be appointed aides de camp to his honor, with either Lieut. Col. McDougall or Captain Lister, of the Royal Regiment, Fredericton, as the third aide de camp.

-On Tuesday a large number of the pupils of St. Louis Convent accompanied by a number of the teachers visited Miss Francis McLaughlin, who has been ill for some time. Last fall Miss McLaughlin taught at the Convent, and was a great favorite with all.
-A new case of smallpox, the first in more than three weeks, was reported in St. John Monday. The victim is Mrs. James H. Irwin, living on Paradise Row, immediately in the rear of the McEwan house in which one of the last cases developed. Mrs. Irwin is 48 years of age. There are six other persons in the house.
-Dr. E. B. Fisher, secretary of the Provincial Board of Health, reports that at the present time New Brunswick is practically free from smallpox. Out side of St. John the only cases of which the board has knowledge are the five recently reported at Lynnfield near St. Stephen. Other sections of the province are free from the disease.
-The many friends of James Thompson will be pleased to learn that he is to receive a pension from the United States government. Mr. Thompson is a veteran of the old North and South war, having served in the ranks of the Northern army. Mr. Thompson will receive a considerable sum of back pay beside a daily allowance of sixty cents for life.
-A report is being circulated that Joseph Woods of Richibucto, has been severely hurt by a tree falling on him while at work in the lumber woods of Maine. His friends hope that the report may prove false, but if true, how strange that he should have been through one year's campaigning in the Boer War unhurt, to be injured so soon after in a peaceful occupation.
-In the supreme court at Fredericton judgement was given in exparte Graves—Rule refused for prohibition to restrain the county court judge of Westmorland from hearing a review from justices of civil court in Albert. The ground of application was that the judge of the county court had no jurisdiction to hear a review in a case tried in any county other than a county of which he is county court judge. The court held otherwise.
-The Hartland Advertiser says:—"George Sadler and a man named Finnmore captured a large loupervier, or "Injun Devil" on the Tobique. It was caught in a trap by simply one claw. With a rope it was lassoed and got into a dry goods box. A Boston museum offered two hundred dollars for the brute if it proved a fine specimen and could be got there alive. On Monday it was sent by express to Boston. Its head was as large as that of a bull dog, with body and limbs three times as big as a full grown domestic cat and somewhat more attenuated. The ears were short. When one peeped into the box he was confronted with two fiery eyes, two rows of gleaming teeth, and a deep subdued growl ending in a "spit" that was blood-curdling enough. It is said that these beasts are almost as numerous as deer on the Tobique.

INABILITY TO OBTAIN EMPLOYMENT THE SUPPOSED CAUSE.

Mr. Chas. V. DeBury, son of Count DeBury, of St. John, attempted to commit suicide by shooting himself in his room at Butte, Montana, on Feb. 1st. The bullet entered the left breast below and to the left of the nipple, narrowly missing the heart, for which it was evidently aimed. It tore through the lower end of the lung and passed out at the back between the sixth and seventh ribs. The would-be suicide was taken to the hospital and will probably recover.

De Bury moved in the best society in Batte. He was dismissed from the auditing department in the Hennessey store some time ago, when the staff position as collector and real estate agent but this he lost owing to depression in that line of business. DeBury was born in St. John, New Brunswick about 27 years ago. He is the son of Count R. V. DeBury, of Belgium, but who now lives with his wife, one son, an attorney, and two daughters, in St. John. Count De Bury is reported to be wealthy. He went west about two years ago.

Mr. DeBury was known by several in Moncton. Some twelve years ago he attended St. Joseph's College, and was an exceptionally clever student.

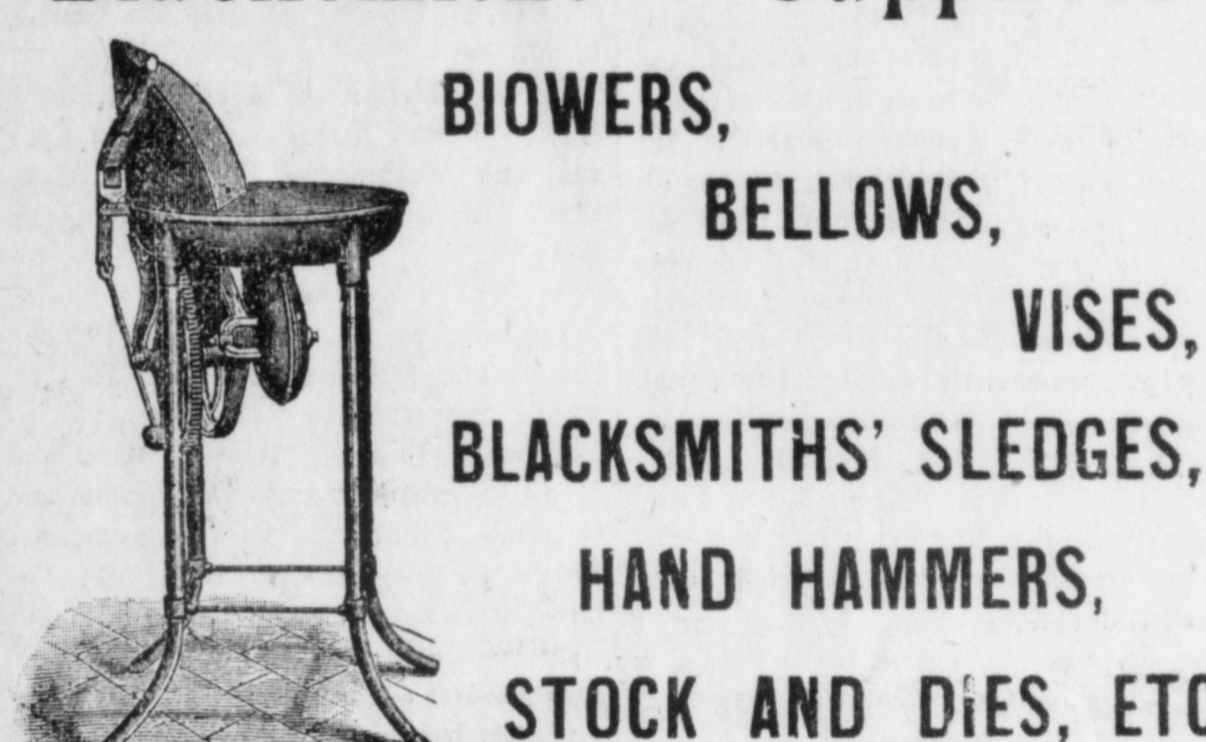
