CZAR MEAGHER.

Judge Meagher, of the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia, is evidently under the belief that he owns the country. The members of the Maritime Board of Trade met at Sydney last week and incidentally decided to have their pictures taken in a group. The services of a photographer were secured and the Sheriff of the County gave them the use of the Court House steps. In the middle of the process Judge Meagher came out of the building and was forced to pick his way through the crowd down the steps. The dignity of His Lordship was severely hurt and he proceeded in a very gentlemanly and judicial manner to abuse the members of the board, referring to them as a "set of blackguards." Mr. DeWolf, one of the leading members, a representative from Halifax, demanded an explanation and apology, but the Judge in an angry manner ordered his arrest for daring to ask such a thing and Mr. DeWolf was taken in charge by the Sheriff. It seems absurd that a judge should have the power to order the arrest of any individual except by process of the Court or in open court for contempt. It may well be doubted that he has any such power. If a judge is clothed with the power to order an arrest in a personal matter, he is certainly as absolute as the Czar of Russia and it is time his powers were in this respect curtailed. It is also time that some of the cranks and fossils were removed from the bench and men of common sense and ordinarily good manners put there in their stead.

SIR WILFRID IN PARIS.

A cable despatch from Paris says: "Sir Wilfrid Laurier had the first of a series of interviews to-day with M. Deleasse, director of the commercial department of the French foreign office, with a view to effecting reduction of duties on certain articles but there is no question as yet of direct negotiations, although something may eventuate. There is a distinct change visible in the attitude of a portion of the Paris press towards Sir Wilfrid Laurier since his last visit. Then he was extolled as the greatest British colonial statesman and his French origin proudly referred to. Now, when the same statesman openly glories in the fact that he is a

British subject and asserts his loyalty to the crown he is represented as 'accommodating himself to Anglo-Saxon conquests.'

"The Francais, in a late issue, says: 'Imagine 50 years hence the premier of Alsace-Lorraine if these provinces are still German, thinking fit to praise the German Emperor and insult the old fatherland. Sir Wilfrid Laurier is such a man, therefore let him leave our midst like the evil minded stranger he has become in our eyes.'"

EXPORT OF PULP WOOD.

The returns for the year ended 30th June, 1901, show that New Brunswick exported more pulp wood during the year than any of the other provinces. Wood to the amount of \$639,800 was sent out of the province to be manufactured in the United States.

In this connection a prominent pulp shipper who is also a paper manufacturer says:

"We must make the actual paper here. It is not sufficient to merely prepare the pulp and then export it. Americans depend on the Canadian forests for their paper and if the position were reversed the Americans would insist on the manufacture of the paper in their own country. This would at once create an immense industry in Canada and I am confident that the government will, sooner or later, see the advisability of enacting legislation which will give Canada a great spur. It may not sound very well to talk this way or to advocate such a 'hoggish' policy, but we can learn something from this great American hog. 'Business is business,' is their maxim, and we should adopt it and leave sentiment alone."

"I nosed around in Norway with my thoughts on the British market. We have a better pulp and can supply it in unlimited quantities. The depletion of the Canadian spruce woods is something which will have to be considered. It will not happen in your time or mine, but it will have to be looked after and I want to see the Canadian government have some proper pride in the interests of Canada. Various provincial governments have passed legislation which helps out the pulp industry, but I think the time has come for the federal government to take up the matter. The sooner it does it the better for Canada."

Says the Halifax Recorder:

Mr Blair, as his London interview discloses, never had any "18-knot idea," but the Tory organ not only declines to publish the interview in which he advocated a much faster service but uses its editorial columns to continue the fabrication, pure and simple, regarding 18-knots. It may develop some day that Tory journals have their agents abroad picked for the purpose of manufacturing interviews with Canadian ministers to be published after the ships have sailed, and when there is no time to follow the take with its contradiction. From the number

of such exposed this summer, it would certainly lead to the belief that there was some conspiracy of this character in existence.

Our Tory contemporaries have had no comment on the remarks of their good friend Senator Wood to the effect that the people should give the government credit for what it has done in inspiring a feeling of hopefulness in Canada which did not exist a few years ago.—Telegraph.

Fattening Chicken Station.

Mr. F. C. Hare, chief of the Dominion Poultry Division, Experimental Farm, Ottawa, has organized a fattening station at Rogersville, and has appointed Mr. Fidele Richard, Postmaster of that place, operator and agent. The Department will pay 6c. per pound live weight, for chickens weighing from 3 to 4 lbs, and will fatten them at government expense, to be shipped to the English markets. Lean chickens, provided they are pure bred or well graded Plymouth Rocks or Wyandotts of proper size and weight, are preferred. No black legs taken, only yellow or white legs.

In order to encourage the new industry and benefit the farmers generally, the same price will be paid at distant places for proper kind. Crates will be sent free and freight to Rogersville station. Further, the Department will distribute through the agent at Rogersville, this fall at reasonable price, chickens of desired breed, to applicants, and eggs next spring, to introduce the required breed. 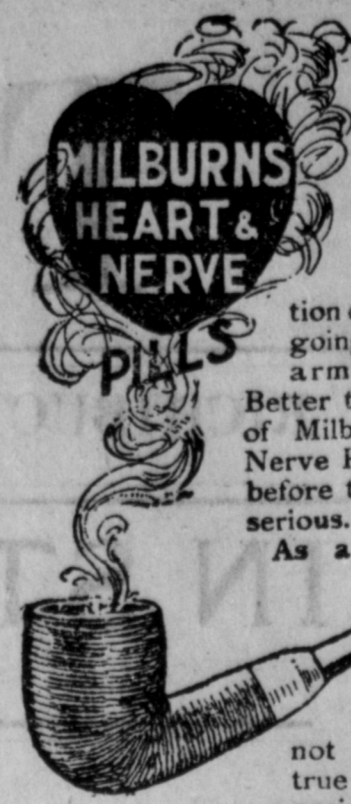
