—The plains between Richibucto and Kent Junction are alive with blueberry pickers. Blue berries have been plentiful in this district and tons have been exported. A. & R. Loggie, R. O'Leary and D. Morison are the principal buyers.

—Word has reached here that William Livingston, seaman, and a man of a roving disposition who has seen the world, and is well known in Richibucto was taken ill on Sunday in the stable of the Kent Northern Hotel, Rexton. Mrs. Malley had him taken in the hotel and the doctor called but nothing could be done for the sufferer. He died at an early hour Tuesday morning.

—The London Telegraph says: "Almost as much praise may be accorded to Mr. Bonar Law, who becomes parliamentary secretary to the board of trade, an appointment which also may indicate a future reshuffling of the pack. Mr. Law is a brilliant speaker, and will appreciably strengthen the debating power of the front bench, which, however, is in no urgent need of assistance, seeing that it will comprise such masters of the art as the prime minister, the two Mr. Chamberlains, and Mr. Wyndham.

—Wm. D. Carter, Indian Superintendent, was called to Bathurst last week by the Clerk of the Peace of Gloucester Co., to represent the Department of Indian Affairs in the inquest held on an Indian woman drowned between the mainland and Indian Island. A small boat capable of holding not more than four or five persons was taken by four white men and three Indian women to cross the passage which is nearly a mile wide. The boat filled and one of the women was drowned. The evidence showed that she had bought or procured a bottle of whiskey and was in an intoxicated condition. The jury brought in a verdict of accidental drowning while in an intoxicated condition. Proceedings have begun against several Bathurst people for violation of the Indian Act in supplying the liquor.
