-The lobster fishery this year in Cape Breton will be the lightest on record, owing to the stormy weather, which destroyed the traps and other gear. With a few exceptions the factories have already closed down.

According to the man's story he drew a knife and first run the men away and afterwards chased Fountain's wife and daughter to the woods.
