

It is no doubt a mild type of small pox but if some of the people of this place had any idea of the malignity of the disease their visits to Buctouche would be less frequent until they are sure it is properly stamped out. As it is the next cases will be as likely to break out in St. Ann or Rexton as Buctouche. But it is to be hoped that it will go no further.

EXECUTION OF FRED LEE RICE AT TORONTO.

TORONTO, July 18.—Fred Lee Rice, of Champaign, Illinois, was hanged in the jail yard at 8 o'clock this morning for killing County Constable Boyd, in a daring attempt to escape. Every effort had been made to obtain a respite; Congressman Cannon and Senator Mason, both of Illinois, have been active on his behalf at Washington. His mother has appealed to Ottawa; petitions have been forwarded, but without success.

Rice went to the gallows without any apparent tremor. He had spent most of yesterday with his spiritual adviser, Rev. Robert Hall, city missionary, and retired last night at 10.35 and lay for some time chatting with his guard. He then fell asleep and seemed to pass a restful night. He arose at 5.30 a.m. Rev. Mr. Hall, who was early at the jail, and after Rice had eaten a light breakfast the minister and he were left alone, and from then until the arrival of Hangman Radcliffe the time was spent in prayer. The march to the scaffold took two minutes and the body was cut down 45 minutes later. His pulse stopped beating twelve minutes after the drop. Rice made no statement on the scaffold.

[Rice's story is a most pathetic one. At school he was the most innocent of lads. He was a native of Illinois and had a university education but fell among bad associates and became an expert crook. The crime for which he was arrested was the robbery of a bank at Aurora, Ont. He and two others, Jones and Rudledge, were arrested in Chicago and brought back to Toronto. While being taken to jail an accomplice threw a hat containing revolvers into the cab. Shooting followed in which Constable Boyd was killed, of the prisoners Jones died of injuries, Rudledge committed suicide in jail. Rice was tried, convicted and sentenced for the murder of the constable.
