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LEGAL NEWSPAPER DECISIONS.

2. Any person who takes a paper regularly from the Post Office-whether directed to his adtress or another, or whether he has subscribed or not-is responsible for the pay.

2. If any person orders his paper discontinued he must pay all arrearages, or the publisher may sontinue to send it until payment is made and collect the whole amount, whether it is taken rom the office or not.

SMALLPOX.

Notwithstanding the efforts made by the Board of Health to check the spread of smallpox in the southern part of this county it has within the last fortnight. broken out in two new places, In Notre Dame the disease was confined to four houses and in Buctouche two dwellings are infected. There are no new cases reported in either of these localities, but in the latter place it is vet too soon to say whether the spread of the disease has been checked or not. News has been received from St. Paul of the ap pearance of smallpox in that locality and the Board of Health has taken steps to quarantine the houses in which it has broken out. The disease appears to be of a smild type and for that reason there appears to be a disposition on the part of the people in infected districts to make light of the matter and treat the orders of the physicians, as to isolation, with scant respect. In Notre Dame violent opposition was made to the quarantine orders until one or two severe cases convinced the people that the danger was greater than they had supposed, and afterwards they were quite willing to obey the quarantine rules. Fortunately at the last meeting of the Municipal Council the sum of five hundred dollars was voted, if required, for the purpose of preventing the spread of the disease in the County of Kent. The Board of Health is therefore not ham pered by want of funds in dealing with the matter. Smallpox appears to have gained a foothold in several parts of the province and it has been found impossible to stamp it out entirely. In one of the Indian bands in the norther part of the province there are more than has been placed in quarantine. SAINT ANNE.

The Micmac Indians every year observe the festival in honor o the good Saint Anne, whom theyf regard with especial veneration. The twenty-sixth day of July is the day set apart by the Roman Catholic Church for this festival and the Indians usually keep up the festivities for two or three days. Saint Anne, according to tradition, was the daughter

ot Mathan, Priest of Bethlehem, and wife of Saint Joachim. Twenty-one years after her marriage her first and only child was born-the Virgin Mary. Nothing in Bay du Vin. positively is known regarding her lite. Her name does not appear. in the scriptures, nor is she mentioned in the writings of the fathers during the first three centuries after the birth of Christ. She is first mentioned by writers of the tourth century and a few centuries afterwards she was all but universally invoked. The Greek church also observes a festival in her honour, but has fixed for its date the ninth of December instead of the twenty-sixth of July. to be in possession of several churches. One is claimed to be in possession of the church at St. Anne de Beaupre in the Province of Quebec and every year a pilgrimage is made to this church to visit the holy shrine and pray for her intercession on behalf of the sick and crippled. TARDY ADVANCES.

But in stead of friendship or fair treatment the British army and people were the subjects of the most malicious falsehoods and vilest calumnies from the German press. The vilest and most indecent prints and cartoons in which the British people were abused and caricatured in the coarsest manner, found a ready circulation in Germany. Tales of British atrocities in South Atrica were manutactured and sent from Berlin in order to injure the British cause in the eyes of other nations. Now that England has emerged from her difficulties and is in a position to make her power and influence felt, the Germans suddenly evince a desire for more triendly relations. These advances have been met with the coldness which they deserve and it is safe to say that relations between the two countries will not be very cordial for some time to come.
