The Grand Pontifical Mass celebrated in the Basilica, Quebec, on Tuesday in connection with the golden jubilee of Laval University, was a most imposing affair, among those officiating being Mr. Falconio, delegate; Mgr. Begin, Archbishop of Quebec; Mgr. Casey, Bishop of St. John, N. B., and Mgr. Mathieu, rector of the University. The banquet in honor of the golden jubilee was attended by 1,500 guests. The King and the Pope were toasted. The degree of D. C. L. was conferred on Hon. J. I. Tarte, Hon. Chas. Fitzpatrick, Hon. H. G. Carroll and others.

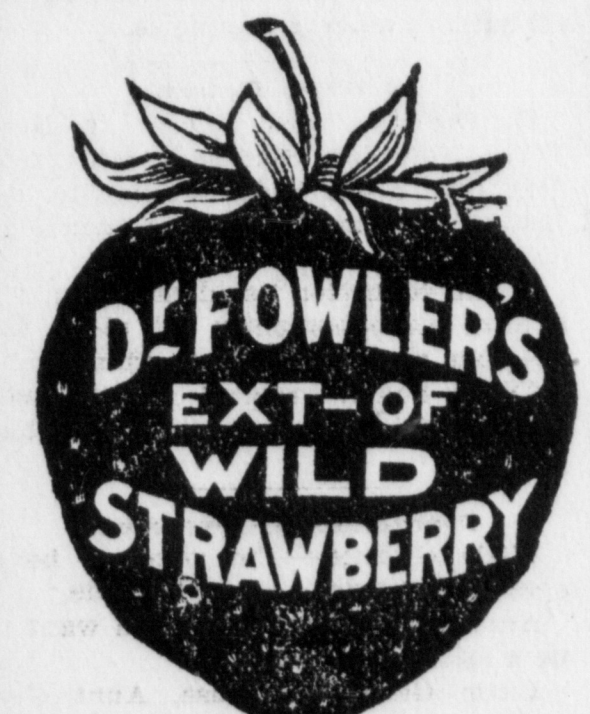

The last of the troubles between the C. P. R. and its trackmen were ended on Wednesday at Montreal, when the bridge-men and water supply department employees were granted increases. The men under this classification number 600 and form part of the trackmen's brotherhood. The minimum has been increased from \$1.40 to \$1.65 a day, while foremen will get from \$2.50 to \$3 a day. These increases apply to the whole system. Other increases vary according to the divisions.
