BRITISH DUTY ON LUMBER

The British government in levy ing new taxes and imposing new duties to meet the expenses of the South African war is said to have in contemplation the re-imposition of the duty on lumber which was abolished nearly half a century ago. As yet no definite action has been taken in the matter and by many it is believed that the government has no serious intentions of imposing such a duty. Others, however, regard it as very prob able that a tax on lumber may be levied, as it is certain that an additional revenue must be raised and it is more likely that an old duty will be revived than that new ones will be imposed. Lumber dealers are said to be feeling a little uncomfortable over the prospect of such a duty. The Canada Lumberman says that the idea has been seriously considered by the Chancellor of the Exchequer and "that the custom authorities a "some of the east coast ports have "been requested to send in ful "statistics of the wood goods im "ported to their districts. The statement is "also made that an insurance for "twelve months against the im "position of the tax has already "been effected at Lloyds." It is a question how far the imposition of such a duty would affect New Brunswick lumber. Most of our spruce lumber is shipped to Great Britain, but by far the greater quantity of lumber imported into Great Britain comes from the Baltic. Prices are largely regulated by the quantity sent from the Baltic. It is possible that, in case such a duty is imposed, it will not apply to importations from the colonies, or it is quite possible that a preferential tariff may be allowed in favor of colonial lumber. In either case there would be a great increase in the lumber trade between this province and Great Britain and the increase in prices would be correspondingly large.
