

BOERS DRESSED IN KHAKI

PUT THE BRITISH TO FLIGHT AND CAPTURE GEN. METHUEN.

LONDON, March 10.—General Methuen and four guns have been captured by General Delany.

LONDON, March 10.—General Methuen was wounded in the thigh. Five British officers and 38 men were killed. Five British officers and 72 men were wounded. One British officer and 200 men are missing.

The fight in which General Methuen was captured occurred on the dawn of March 7 between Winburg and Litchenburg Orange River Colony. The British force numbered 1,200 men. The Boers captured all the British guns. Gen. Methuen is retained as a prisoner.

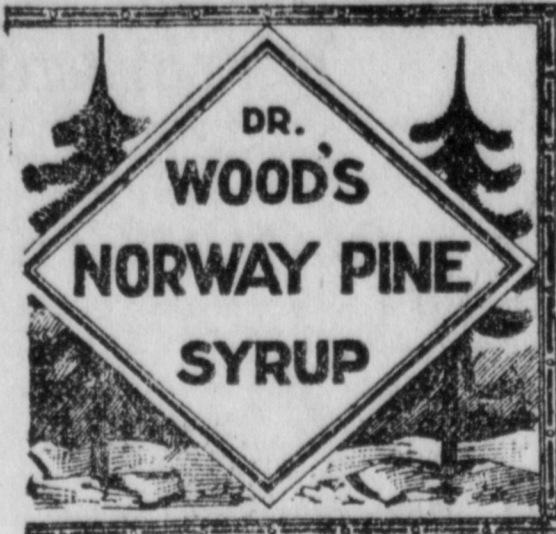

Miss McIntosh, of Black River, is visiting her sister, Mrs. Alex. Lawson.

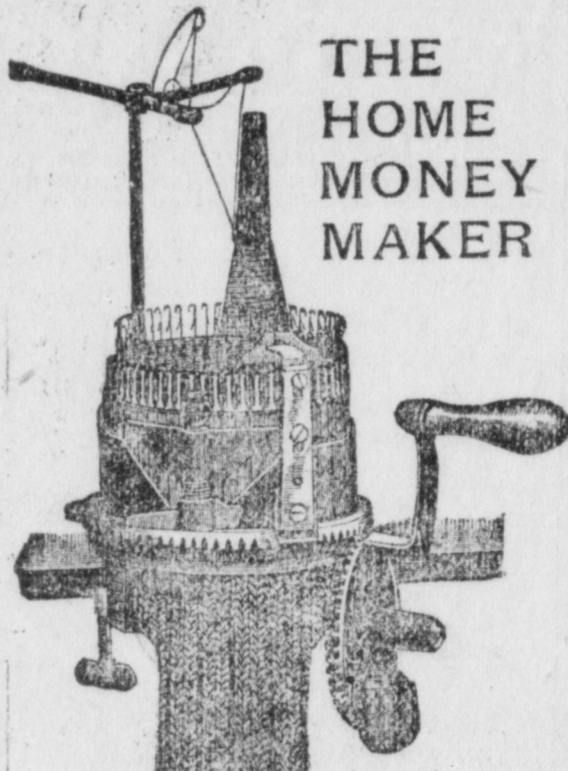
The weather during the past two weeks has been very unfavorable for the farmers who are engaged hauling mussel mud.

KING EDWARD

Laid Foundation Stone of New Royal Naval College.

LONDON, March 7.—King Edward, accompanied by Queen Alexandra, laid the foundation stone of the new Royal Naval College for Cadets at Dartmouth, Friday, and thereby, figuratively speaking, scuttled the old training ship Britannia, the Alma Mater of all the present generation of British naval officers.

The Mounted Police at the Stockdale Road House, Yukon, captured William Brophy, a notorious robber, after a ten weeks' hunt. During the scuffle, while arresting him, a revolver, belonging to one of the policemen, exploded, the bullet going through Brophy's abdomen and emerging near the spine. The police have spent over \$10,000 in the search for Brophy, and his capture is the most noted since that of murderer O'Brien.
