## CANNOT COERCE CANADA.

"England demands no reciproc ity. She has adjusted her commerce to our protective system; and so long as that policy is substantially maintained with her and her European trade rivals. on Hence, our British commerce, it expanded at all, must be expanded by other means than reciprocity. During the past third of a century British expansion has trade has increased in exact pro portion. As England has grown, so have our exports. The corol lary is, if you curtail British ter ritory or British influence you necessarily curtail American com exports; anything that injures England injures one-half of our foreign trade. If Russia should drive England from India, if Bri irretrievably suffer. If the mills of Manchester and Liverpool and Leeds should shut down, if England should cease to buy our corn cultural and mineral products, financial loss would fall on millions of American producers. In short, any calamity to England, any halt to her growth, any staggering under her burden of emturning back in her national progress, would injure our commerce. as no other international event could do." Mr. Gardiner advocated reciprocity with Canada and discussed at some length the subject of annexation. He seemed to have no faith in such coercion schemes as were embodied in the McKinley and Dingley tariffs "Many," he remarked, "who desire annexation think that by refusing trade concessions we can destroy Canadian commerce and compel the Dominion to accept annexation as the only escape from economic tagonized her colonies and alien-




