Charles A. Gardiner, a member of the Bar of New York City, delivered an address last week on Commercial Expansion of the United States, in the course of which he said:

"England demands no reciprocity. She has adjusted her commerce to our protective system; and so long as that policy is substantially maintained with her and her European trade rivals, so long will she give us free trade; and she can do nothing more. Hence, our British commerce, if expanded at all, must be expanded by other means than reciprocity."

Mr. Gardiner advocated reciprocity with Canada and discussed at some length the subject of annexation. He seemed to have no faith in such coercion schemes as were embodied in the McKinley and Dingley tariffs.

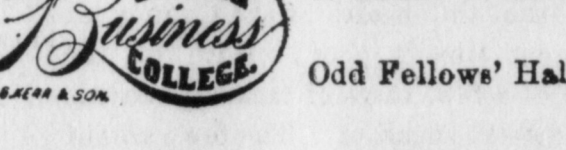
