JOHN LONG DANGEROUSLY ILL.—Mr. Wm. Long on Sunday evening received a dispatch from Ottawa to the effect that his son, John, was dangerously ill of enteric fever at Heidelberg, the dispatch was dated January 21st. John Long who is only twenty years of age, left here as a member of the South African Constabulary.

LEGAL.—The January term of the Kent County Court opened on Tuesday of last week before Judge Wells. There was no criminal business and no jury. The only civil business was a review on the case of Allen D. Irving vs. George Long. This was an action for seaman's wages tried before Robert H. Davis, J. P., and a verdict found for plaintiff. The ground of review was that a Justice of the Peace has no jurisdiction in such cases and that the action should have been brought in the summary manner provided by the Merchants' Shipping Act. Judgment was given setting aside the verdict and ordering a nonsuit to be entered without costs of review. H. H. James for plaintiff; Wm. D. Carter for defendant.

DEATH OF ROBERT LAW.—Mr. Robert Law of Rexton, died at his late residence on Thursday afternoon at two o'clock. Deceased had been in failing health for some time with a lingering illness. He was a son of the late Rev. James Law, and was in the fiftieth year of his age. He married the late Isabel Brown of Richibucto, by whom he leaves four surviving children, one daughter and three sons. Deceased also leaves three sisters and three brothers in Scotland, one of whom, Bonnar Law, is a member of the British House of Commons. The interment took place on Saturday afternoon, in the Presbyterian burial ground at Rexton in the presence of a large number of friends of the deceased. The Rev. Mr. Fraser officiated, assisted by the Rev. Mr. Johnson of Newcastle. The pall-bearers were Messrs. James Jardine, Geo. N. Clark, H. Russ, Andrew Dixon, Robert Phinney and H. M. Ferguson.

ENCORE.—Another success crowned the efforts of the R. A. D. C. when they placed on the boards the drama "Because I Love You" before a large and appreciative house in the Public hall at Rexton on Friday evening.
