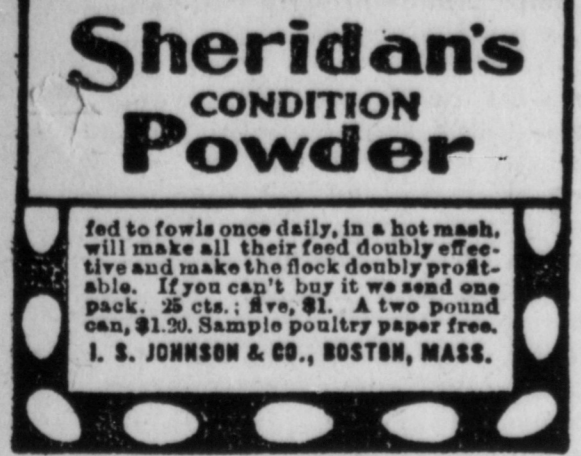


One Hen One Day One Mill

KENT COUNTY COUNCIL.

Moved by Coun. Lockhart, seconded by Coun. Poirier, and resolved, that the sum of \$1.00 (money overpaid) be paid to Simon Bourque, Collector of Rates, No. 2, Dundas, and charged to the Parish of Dundas.

Moved by Coun. B. J. Johnson, seconded by Coun. Barribeau, and resolved, that a committee be appointed by the Warden, (he himself to be a member of this committee) and that they be authorized to borrow from the Royal Bank of Canada, at Rexton, an amount not to exceed \$500.00, and that this amount be borrowed, in case there is no money in the treasury, and in case there is money in the treasury, then the Treasurer be authorized to pay them, any sum or sums, not to exceed \$500.00, and to be used only in case the small pox should come into this County.

The committee stands as follows: The Warden, Couns. F. S. Peters, Robert Saulnier, John McKee and Richard Poirier.

The Warden appoints the following committees:

Jail Committee: Couns. F. M. Richard, Gilbert Richard and David Clark.

Wharf Committee: Couns. Pascal Hebert, Anthony Roach and M. H. Daigle.

The list of parish officers for the Parish of Richibucto for 1902 was read and on motion accepted.

The list of parish officers for the Parish of St. Mary's for 1902 was read and on motion accepted.

Moved by Coun. Morton, seconded by Coun. Roach, and resolved, that the sum of \$2.00 placed in the Treasurer's hands by Commissioner M. Barnard, be returned to the Parish of Welford.

The Sheriff, by permission, spoke a few words with reference to an office, which he would like to have provided for him. He would like to have a part of the office recently occupied by Mr. Sayre.

Coun. McKee said that he thought they had neglected one thing. He thought

that the Jail committee should have authority to deal with matters of this kind, and he would move that the Jail committee be empowered to look after the buildings and other Municipal property and to look after all rents and fees. The motion was seconded and resolved.

Coun. McKee brought up two constables bills, each for 75cts. It seemed that the Stipendiary magistrate would not sign these bills, but the constables had proved that they had done duty to deserve the money. Coun. McKee said, that while it might not be law, that he thought it was justice, and he moved that these bills be paid. It was seconded by Coun. B. Johnson. Coun. Hebert spoke on the matter. Mr. James gave it as his opinion that Mr. Davis was not to blame. Mr. Hebert spoke again and afterwards, Coun. McKee. It was resolved that the bills be paid.

Coun. McKee then brought up the case of Mr. Dunlap, whose bill was for \$22.00 but unsigned by the Stipendiary. He said that he liked to see the constables paid when they did their duty, and he moved that the sum of \$20.00 be paid Mr. Dunlap for constable fees. Coun. Peters seconded the motion, and it was resolved.

Coun. McKee said that he thought that the Council ought to consider the matter referring to the Moncton hospital; he thought that in due courtesy, the Council ought to take some move in the matter. He was not going to advise that it vote a large amount of money, or any amount, but he thought, that it would be unfair and discourteous, to dismiss the matter without consideration. Coun. Hebert thought that we had better let it lay on the table until next year.

It was moved by Coun. Johnson, seconded by Coun. Richard, and resolved, that the Secretary be instructed to write to Mr. Hamilton in reply to his communication from the Moncton Hospital stating that the matter had been brought before the Council, and they had decided to consider it at their next session.

Coun. Daigle moved that the Parish lines between St. Louis and Carleton be run over by a surveyor and the cost be divided between the two parishes.

Coun. McKee moved an amendment to this, seconded by Coun. B. Johnson, that this matter stand over until the next meeting of the Council. Resolved.

Moved by Coun. Morton, seconded by Coun. Peters, that W. D. Carter be appointed Auditor, at the same salary as last year. Resolved.

Moved by Coun. Johnson, seconded by Coun. Barribeau, and resolved, that W. E. Forbes be appointed Treasurer, at the same salary as last year.

A standing vote of thanks is tendered by the Warden to Miss F. A. Caie, who has been reporting the minutes of this session.

The minutes of to-day's meeting are read by the Secretary.

Coun. Peters said that there was one matter which the Council had overlooked, that was, that the Treasurer open an account with the Royal Bank of Canada, Rexton, and deposit a sum of \$450.00 annually, as a sinking fund for the redemption of debentures. The motion was seconded by Coun. Hebert and resolved.

Moved by Coun. Richard, seconded by Coun. Daigle, and resolved, that the Secretary send instructions, with the delinquent lists, when they go back to the collectors, that they return the money as soon as collected.

Moved by Coun. Peters, seconded by Coun. Daigle, and resolved that the minutes just read be approved.

Moved by Coun. Richard, seconded by Coun. Johnson, and resolved that the Warden leave the chair and Coun. Johnson take his place. Coun. B. Johnson takes the chair, and it is moved and seconded that a vote of thanks be tendered to the Warden for the efficient manner in which he had presided over the Council.

The motion is unanimously carried by a standing vote. Coun. Johnson, in tendering the vote of thanks, says that he has never set under a Warden who ruled in a more impartial manner. The Warden makes a suitable reply, and the Council adjourns sine die.

At a meeting of the Guides Association at Fredericton on Tuesday last it was agreed to have a delegation wait upon Surveyor General Dunn, and recommend that the game law be amended so as to have the open season for big game commence on September 1st instead of the 15th as at present. The members of the association are firmly convinced that such a change would be in the interests of the province, and they would not object to having the season shortened by cutting off the last two weeks in December, providing they are allowed the first fortnight in September.
