—The Assessors of taxes for the various parishes are getting to work at the assessment. It is so constructed that it can be put up and taken down without the use of nails, and was taken apart and yesterday loaded upon a box car and will go forward with the rest of the exhibit.—Fredericton Gleaner, Friday.

—Mr. J. H. Abbott, the genial and popular manager of the Royal Bank of Canada here, has been transferred to Ottawa to take charge of the bank's branch there. Mr. Abbott leaves for Ottawa at once, probably the latter part of this week or the first of next. Mr. Abbott is one of the most popular bank managers ever residing in this city. He has a wide circle of warm personal friends and enjoys the respect and esteem of the entire community. Mr. Abbott came here from Kingston, Kent, about six or seven years ago and under his able management the Moncton branch of the Royal Bank of Canada has become one of the most important in the maritime provinces. His promotion to one of the most important branches in the Dominion is a worthy tribute to his ability. While his advancement is a matter for congratulation yet Mr. Abbott's removal from Moncton will be deeply regretted by his friends who will regard it as a personal loss. His successor is as yet unknown here.—Times.

The Late Simon Graham. Mr. Simon Graham, one of the oldest and most respected citizens of Rexton passed away last Friday in the seventy-sixth year of his age. Deceased was the son of the late Simon Graham master mariner, who came to this county from Kirkenburghshire, Scotland, on the 13th Jan., 1826, and came out to Richibucto in the "Ellen Douglas," Captain Forest, when a child.

He began business in Rexton (then Kington) about forty years ago and at one time carried on an extensive shipping and mercantile business. He married the youngest daughter of the late Samuel Girvan of Galloway, and sister of the late William Girvan, for many years cashier of the Bank of New R. N. Wick. He leaves one daughter, Mrs. James Jardine, of Rexton. The funeral took place Sunday and was largely attended. The services at the house and grave were conducted by Rev. Wm. Aitkin of Newcastle. His remains were interred in the Presbyterian burying ground in Galloway.
