A MATHEMATICAL PROBLEM

Can You Solve It or Prove That It Cannot Be Solved?

At a lecture at the Royal Institution on the fascinating subject of "Magic Squares" Major P. A. MacMahon, F. R. S., reminded his audience of the existence of a curious problem which, despite its apparent simplicity, has never yet been solved.
