Members of the Amalgamated Woodworkers Union, numbering 135, employed in the Dominion Piano and Organ Company, of Bowmanville have decided to strike for twenty per cent. increase in wages and recognition of their union.

A big strike of gold is reported at Forty Mile Creek, B. C., followed by a general influx.

It is announced in Ottawa that Mr. J. N. E. Brown is to be appointed the Yukon Commissioner's secretary for territorial purposes, and Mr. Clement D. Burns, secretary for Federal purposes.

S. S. Delano, from Rotterdam for Baltimore, is ashore at Seal Cove, about twenty miles east of Cape Race. She is 1,900 tons and one of the Pinkney line.

Rev. J. W. Muirhead, a well-known Presbyterian minister, died at Kingston, Ont., on Thursday, aged thirty-six.

The Sons of England supreme lodge, in convention at Winnipeg, has rejected the proposal to admit other than descendants of Englishmen to the order.

The supreme lodge also rejected proposal to debar non-beneficiary members from election as supreme officers, to create the office of 2nd vice-president and to elect a financial secretary by the supreme lodge. It was decided that delegates be elected in December instead of in June.

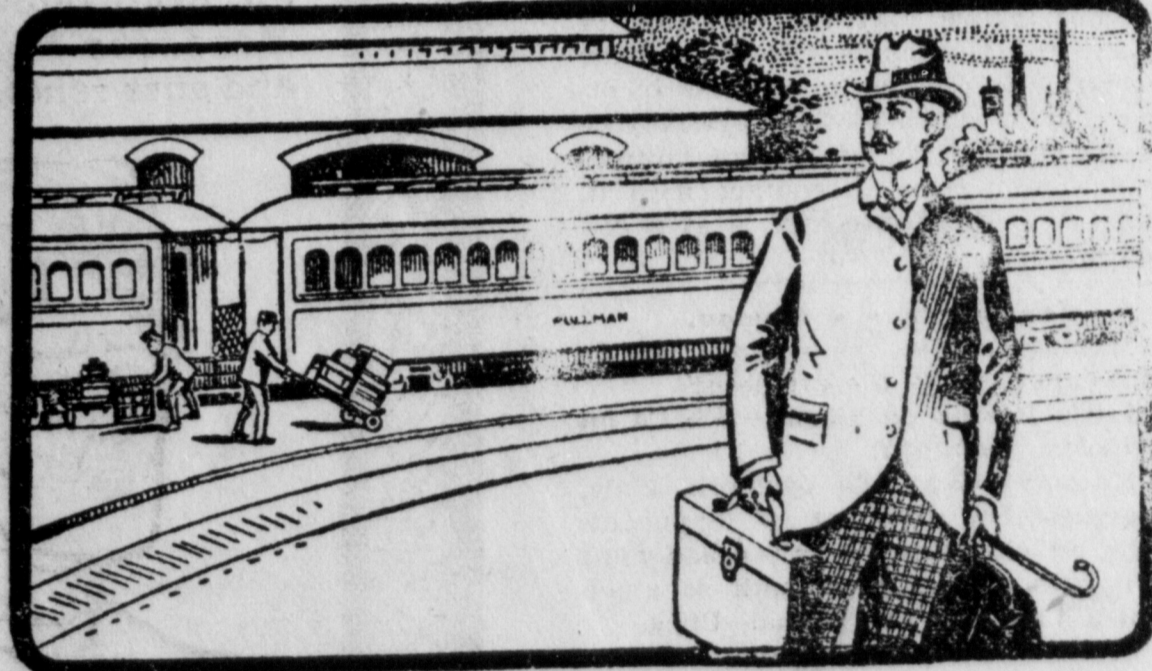

A riot occurred at the Warke washery at Duryea, Pa., on Thursday. Men and boys collected about the place and threw stones over the stockade at the deputies who were on guard inside.
