A big strike of gold is reported at Forty Mile Creek, B. C., followed by a general influx.



Rail Fences and Dugout Canoes Survive Civilization's March.

RELICS OF EARLY DAYS.

One of the remarkable features of country life in America is the singular persistence of the rail fence and the dugout canoe. No matter how thickly settled a section may become or how long it may have been settled, these two survivors of early settlement linger on as stubbornly as ever. Today in the thickest settled parts of New England and New York the rail fence is met with, while the shad fishermen of the Potomac and James rivers and Chesapeake bay, on the banks of which the first English settlements in America were established, still manufacture and employ the old dugout canoe in making the rounds of their shad nets.

The dugout canoe is the simplest and most primitive water craft known and was used by prehistoric man, both in this country, Europe and Asia. It is made out of a log of wood by trimming the outside down to the proper proportions of a boat and by "digging out" the inside with an adz and by the aid of fire. The Potomac river dugout is today pretty much the same as it was in the days of Powhatan and differs from the general run of dugout canoes in the absence of a curved bow and stern and in having rather high sides, which rise to a summit from either end of the boat, being highest in the middle, where the seat is placed.
