KENT COUNTY INVENTION.—Mr. O. C. Gogan, watchmaker and jeweller of Buctouche, N. B., has invented a new escapement for the pendulum clock. It is claimed to be the best escapement ever invented, costs but little to make and is strong, lasting, easy running, and wants but little force to drive any pendulum clock. The movement for regulating is the same as the escapement now on pendulum clocks. Mr. Gogan's escapement has no escape wheel, and there is no verge to it. There is a pendulum ball and rod, but he will not state the rest at present. The spring that gives power to the escapement is a very small one. Mr. Gogan has already received letters from the States wanting him to sell his patent and has been offered a big sum of money for his invention. He has been writing to the States to know if such a patent is wanted, and the answer was, "If you have a new invention for escapement of pendulum clocks your fortune is made." Mr. Gogan, however, is not in a hurry to send his patent to the States.
