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## MARITIME PROVINCE NOTES.

Truro firemen made the town lively last Thursday night at their annual sleigh drive. They did the town and then spent the evening at the Central fire house with a big dinner and speeches.

A C. P. R. report issued at Montreal Monday referred to the boom in St. John. This week, it says, there are 600 carloads of package freight awaiting shipment in Carleton and 323 carloads at McAdam.

John Alex. Nicholson, a native of P. E. Island, has been appointed registrar of McGill. He was head master of Westmount Academy.

Mariner Steeves, aged 19, was arraigned on 15th inst., on charge of forgery. He pleaded guilty and was sentenced to three years in Dorchester penitentiary. The sum involved was about \$25 or \$30.—Times.

It is reported that the Dominion Iron & Steel Company and Dominion Coal Company will likely be amalgamated under one management at an early date.

Benjamin F. Pearson, George Pearson, Halifax; James Friel, Dorchester; Steadman Crandall, Moncton; F. W. Emerson, Sackville, are seeking incorporation as the Bay of Fundy Oil Company, Limited; proposed capital \$500,000, divided into shares of one dollar each. The company asks authority to bore for oil and gas in New Brunswick. The head office is to be at Moncton.

Senator Wark celebrated his 98th birthday at Fredericton on Wednesday, and received many congratulatory telegrams, including one signed by all the Liberal members of the senate. The veteran legislator is enjoying the best of health and expects to leave for Ottawa in the course of a few weeks to take up his parliamentary duties. He has been continuously in public life for upwards of 60 years, and is undoubtedly the world's oldest legislator, both in years and experiences.

Mr. J. R. Woodburn, president of the F. C. Colwell Candy Company, has purchased the company's stock and plant and will engage in the business of manufacturing confectionery under his own name.

The Minister of Marine and Fisheries has appointed a commission to investigate the cause of the accident to the Grecian in Halifax harbor. Commander Spain will be commissioner, and Capt. Bloemfield Douglas and Capt. Murphy, of Yarmouth, assessors. The inquiry will begin at Halifax Friday next.

In the Nova Scotia Legislature Wednesday Attorney General Langley, acting premier, presented the financial statement of the province of Nova Scotia in the Legislature. The total revenue for the year was \$1,090,222.88, and the total expenditure \$1,088,926.56, leaving a surplus of \$1,296.32. The revenue from mines and minerals, which is the largest item, was \$437,726.77.

Flemming, who was in charge of the Ocean Line steamer Grecian when she went ashore at the entrance of Halifax harbor, has been dismissed from the pilot service.

A westbound freight in charge of conductor McLellan collided with the fast express for Sydney near North Sydney Junction at one o'clock Thursday morning. The engine of the fast express was slightly damaged, and the other engine still less. No one was hurt, the passenger getting only a shaking up. The track was not damaged. The accident was due to misunderstanding of a signal.

It is understood that the yield of gold during the past year from mines in Nova Scotia is the second largest that has ever been obtained, says the Kentville Chronicle. The highest was 31,000 ounces. It is stated that the yield during the past year was in the vicinity of 30,000 ounces. The value of this quantity of gold is about \$570,000.

Miss Clara Bridges severed her connection with the Model school teaching staff at Fredericton on Friday last. The teaching staff is presenting her with a handsome gold fountain pen and her pupils with a valuable finger ring. Miss Bridges and her sister purpose leaving about the middle of March for Pretoria, where they have accepted positions as teachers in the public school service.

The War Office has granted permission for the 14 men of the 2nd C. M. R. left behind in hospital at Halifax to be forwarded to South Africa by any steamer sailing from St. John, N. B. The men are all anxious to go.

### MARINE AND FISHERIES.

ANNUAL REPORT OF DEPARTMENT—STATEMENT OF CASUALTIES TO VESSELS.

OTTAWA, Feb. 19.—The annual report of the marine and fisheries department was issued to-day. The total expenditure for light houses coast service was \$578,812, an increase of \$62,318 over the same time last year. The total expenditure of the department was \$967,484.

The total number of casualties to British and Canadian sea going vessels reported to the department as having occurred in Canadian waters and to Canadian sea-going vessels in waters other than those of Canada during the 12 months ended June 30, 1901, was 136, representing 47,181 tons register, and the amount of loss, both partial and total, to vessels and cargoes, as far as ascertained was \$285,782. The number of casualties to inland vessels so far as have been reported, were slight and unimportant.

### THE POPE'S JUBILEE.

TWENTY-FIVE YEARS TO-DAY SINCE HE ENTERED THE CHAIR OF ST. PETER.

ROME, Feb. 20.—The Pope entered the 25th year of his pontificate to-day, although the main celebration of the Jubilee is postponed until March 3, when the combined festivals of the Jubilee and Coronation will be observed. To-day was marked by the singing of a Te Deum in St. Peter's, and other observances. The Pontiff, who was the recipient of congratulations from all sides, remarked to one well wisher that his Jubilee was brightened by the resignation yesterday of Count Giusso, minister of public works, who left the government rather than approve of the divorce bill.

PROMISES A MOTIVE POWER REVOLUTION.

GERMANY HAS RECENTLY PERFECTED WONDER, BUT IT'S NOT MADE PUBLIC YET

LONDON, Feb. 18.—Assertions have been made in the press in the past few days that a new valve mechanism, which has been tested on the Great Northern Railway, will reduce coal consumption 40 per cent. and that a locomotive thus fitted and with 140 pounds of steam will do more work than an ordinary one with 210 pounds. The president of the road told the stockholders that its importance was probably exaggerated.

It may be added here that another invention which is really epoch-making was recently perfected, and will be soon announced. It has been tested by the highest authorities, who affirm that it will revolutionize the motive power of the world. It cannot be described now, but it comes from Germany.

MONEY EASILY EARNED.

HOW AN INTERVIEWER WON A WAGER THAT BROUGHT MUCH SATISFACTION.

J. Pierpont Morgan, the American financier, makes his boast that he never has been interviewed, and declares that in the last seven years but one interviewer ever has been able to approach him. This was on a recent trip to Europe, when a representative of a big London daily would not take "No" for his answer.

"Tell the man my time is worth £10 a minute," at last said Morgan.

"The gentleman says he'll take two minutes at that," came back the reply.

The interviewer handed Mr. Morgan £20, talked just two minutes by both their watches, did all the talking himself, and rose to go on the instant.

"Why did you want to see me?" Morgan asked, in curiosity.

"Oh, I wagered £100 that I would interview you personally, that's all," was the reply.

Morgan congratulated him on his enterprise and dismissed him within the third minute of his call. When asked, the other day, if he kept the £20, Morgan said:

"Yes, and I haven't earned money in a long time that gave me the satisfaction that £20 did."

The Evening Telegram's London cable says: "A correspondent in the Times to-day says an important scheme for the development of immigration to western Canada has finally been arranged by deputy Minister of the Interior smart, who has been in London for some time with that object. No fewer than 2,500 to 3,000 persons will leave Liverpool or Glasgow during March to settle in Canada, while others are expected to follow in April, May and June at the rate of four thousand per month. These figures are considered too high in immigration circles."

Dr. R. M. Bucke, widely known as medical superintendent of the London insane asylum and insanity expert, was killed by a fall out of the veranda of his own house on Thursday. The fall caused concussion of the brain.

A cablegram received at Ottawa says the Canadian nurses have sailed for South Africa from England and will reach Cape Town about March 5.

Small pox is raging in the parish of St. John, Quebec, and churches and schools have had to be closed down. There are about forty cases of the disease.

### HELEN KELLER'S FIRST EARNINGS.

SHE WANTED MONEY TO BUY AN ISLAND FOR A SUMMER HOME AND SHE EARNED IT.

There is a pretty story in connection with the series of articles which Helen Keller, the wonderful blind girl, has written for The Ladies' Home Journal, telling about her own life from infancy to the present day. She always has shrank from the publicity which follows successful literary work, and it was with great difficulty that she was persuaded to take up the task of preparing her autobiography. She had, however, set her heart on owning an island in Halifax harbor for a summer home, and in a spirit of fun the editor of The Journal offered to buy it for her, or to provide the means to buy it. When the work of writing appeared especially irksome Miss Keller was reminded of her desire to become a land-holder, and it spurred her on. Just before Christmas she completed the first chapter of her marvellous story; and on Christmas morning she received from her publishers a check for a good round sum. Her delight may be imagined, for this was the first money of any account which she had ever earned. "It is a fairy tale come true," she said. Whether she will really carry out her plan to buy the island remains to be seen.

Included amongst the returns brought down in Parliament on Wednesday was a detailed statement of the manner in which the additional \$20,000,000 of C. P. R. stock is to be expended: 300 additional locomotives, about \$3,800,000; 5,000 additional freight cars, \$3,500,000; 100 additional passenger cars, \$600,000; 40 additional sleeping, dining and parlor cars, \$520,000; new workshops, \$1,500,000; reduction of grades and improvement of alignment in North Bay and Carleton Junctions, \$500,000; ditto between Winnipeg and the mountains, \$3,000,000; second track between Winnipeg and Fort William, \$2,500,000; improvement in grades and alignment of Short Line between Montreal and St. John, \$900,000; additional elevators, terminals, sidings, etc., \$3,000,000.

During the course of the search Thursday for bodies of the victims of the recent earthquake at Shamaka, which is said to have resulted in the loss of about 2,000 lives, 32 persons were disinterred alive.

The Boston Association of British Naval and Military Veterans last Wednesday night dedicated the Union Jack presented to the association by the Prince and Princess of Wales at St. John during their visit to the provinces. More than two hundred members of the association and their friends were present. The dedication service was that of the Church of England, changed to allow for the use of the American flag. The service was conducted by Captain-Chaplain F. W. Grant, formerly of the royal navy, and now a Baptist clergyman in Mansfield, Mass. The chaplain was assisted by a quail under the command of Col. A. P. Graham, the commander of the association.

### AWFUL JOURNEY THROUGH AIR.

BALLOONIST'S FATAL TRIP AT RATE OF TWO MILES A MINUTE.

BERLIN, Feb. 16.—Details of the fearful balloon journey which Capt. Tarisch von Siegfried recently made from Berlin to Antwerp, ending in his death, have been made known by his companion, Dr. Linke.

The distance, 400 miles, was made in five hours and 13 minutes. It takes an express train 15 hours to make the run by rail. The balloon attained the most terrific speed between Hildesheim and Wessel, going at the rate of 135 miles an hour.

At one time the balloon was flying at the rate of 60 yards a second, about two miles a minute.

### BODY WEIGHED 700 POUNDS.

NEW YORK, Feb. 15.—It required the utmost strength of twelve men to carry to the grave the casket containing the remains of Dennis Leahy, whose funeral has just been held. The dead man weighed 700 pounds. His enormous weight had been acquired within the past ten years. When he turned the 500 pound mark two years ago a physician pronounced his case due to fatty degeneration of the heart, and told Leahy his death was only a question of time. Appreciating the trouble his innumerable might cause his friends, Leahy hunted up a place of residence close to a cemetery, and it was necessary to carry the casket only a short distance.
