On Saturday the Kent Northern train was several hours late having had to wait at the Junction to make connections as traffic was blocked on the I. C. R. three miles south of Rogersville. Ten cars of McDougall's westbound special were derailed at that point at 7.30 in the morning. The track was cleared in the afternoon. No person was injured, but the loss to rolling stock will be considerable.

At a public meeting under the auspices of the Carpenters' and Joiners' Union in St. John, the Daily Telegraph of Saturday, says: Geo. V. McInerney delivered an excellent address, in which he dealt with the benefits to be derived from labor unions. He advocated the representation in parliament of the Labor party. In St. John he said there were 3,600 men affiliated with labor and trade unions. By uniting, the ballot in the hands of these men would be a powerful weapon.

The death took place at the General Public Hospital in St. John on Saturday evening of Mr. Sylvian Richards, at one time proprietor of the Musquash Hotel and later of the Ben Lomond House, from which he retired about five years ago. Mr. Richards was a native of Richibucto Cape, and was 79 years of age. He is survived by two brothers, one at the Cape and one at Rogersville. A son and a daughter reside in St. John and another son, Edward, is an engineer at Sydney.
