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### NOMINATION DAY!

Nomination proceedings passed off very quietly here last Saturday. The crowd in attendance was smaller and far less enthusiastic than is usual on such occasions. This probably arose from the fact that the government candidates are known to be poor speakers, and the electors did not turn out in very large numbers to hear a debate which they knew would be very one-sided. Fully two-thirds of these present were in sympathy with the opposition. The best of order prevailed, however, and each speaker was given a good hearing. The sheriff and his clerk, Mr. J. T. **J. D. PHINNEY**  
was first called upon. He said that the right of the people to express themselves on any public question was an inalienable right of the British people. It was found in the old right of petition, and has been a part of our heritage of freedom. It is eminently proper that on all great questions of public policy the people be appealed to as early as possible. Sir John A. McDonald had recognized this in the matter of the national policy, and had the mandate of the electors in his hand when he inaugurated that great change in our political and financial life; but these appeals should not be made on all trivial pretexts, nor to serve factions or personal ends. Mr. Blair has seen fit to dissolve the house now, when only a part of its natural life has expired, and throw the province into the turmoil, excitement and expense of a general election, with all its concomitants of ill-feeling, loss of time to the electors, and general unrest, in addition to the very serious tax on the revenues of the province, for you will remember that elections cost us a heavy sum each, and, while a necessity, are, if used as a luxury, a costly one.

Mr. Blair, however, claims that he has good reasons for this, because by now dissolving the House he will, by so doing, also abolish the Legislative Council. Do you believe this? If Hon. A. G. Blair had really wished to abolish the Council, he could have done so years ago by accepting the proposal of Hon. Robert Young, one of the opposition. He proposed the abolition of the Council, but his proposal was not accepted by Mr. Blair. Why? Because Blair wished to have the Council as long as possible, a lever by which he could squeeze out money for election funds, and also that he might hold a seat there dangling before his supporters as a bribe. He had sold a seat to James I. Fellow, a wealthy gentleman living in London, and got, as the price of this infamous deal, a sum amounting to many thousands of dollars. No, Blair did not wish to abolish the Council! When at last he mustered up the courage to do so, he had nominated members enough to overcome the resistance of the parties already in the Council who were not in favor of his proposal. But he showed in these appointments either a very great want of sincerity, or else a great want of knowledge of his men—either defect being a fatal one in a leader—as they did not carry out the purpose for which they
