DIRECT TAXATION.

The Gazette is the only newspaper in the city of St. John recognized as a local government organ. Its views may therefore be taken as representing those of Mr. Blair and his government. In view of this fact, its utterances on the subject of direct taxation will be read with a feeling of alarm by electors of "rural" constituencies. It acknowledges that a murmur has gone forth concerning the direct tax bill of last session, and cannot understand why so "great a hue and cry has been raised throughout the province against direct taxation."

PROVINCIAL FINANCES.

The electorate of New Brunswick should consider well the situation and give their attention to the financial state of the province before casting their votes on the 22nd inst. In his manifesto Mr. Blair carefully refrains from giving any information on this subject. Last year he was compelled to acknowledge a deficit of \$60,000. This did not include a number of unpaid bills which were carried over to this year, nor did it include the sum of \$150,000 borrowed to build and repair bridges.

Mr. Legere has at last found a man willing to become a victim. The ticket will be Legere and Barnes. Mr. J. E. Gogain's card, and the joint card of Messrs. Phinney and Gogain, appear in this issue.

Restigouche Teacher's Institute. The teachers' institute for the county of Restigouche met at River Charlie, on the 22nd ult. and continued in session for two days. All the teachers with one or two exceptions—who were prevented by unavoidable circumstances—were present.

In Restigouche, Mr. Murray, who displaced Mr. Blair by showing some signs of independence, has been dropped and Mr. A. Motz, of Campbellton, taken on the government ticket with Mr. Labilliois.

know his political history. He was first elected as a supporter of the Harrington administration and was bought up by Mr. Blair for a few hundred dollars. It is said he afterwards became dissatisfied with Mr. Blair and again offered himself for sale to the opposition. His offer was rejected and he has since remained a supporter of Mr. Blair and now occupies a seat in the executive. These charges have been again and again brought forward in the assembly, in the press and from public platforms, but he has always seen fit to let them pass in silence.

The Chatham World has the following to say regarding the situation in this county: "Mr. Phinney has invited Mr. Gogain to run with him in Kent, but Senator Porier and others are urging him to stand for Ottawa. Mr. Legere had Mr. Barnes to run with him on the government side at last accounts. Mr. Savre is ready to sacrifice his time and money, but the government has received his offer very coldly. Mr. Phinney and Mr. Gogain will carry the county."

At an opposition convention held at Oromocto last Wednesday Messrs. W. E. Perley and Arthur Glasier were selected as the opposition standard-bearers in Sunbury. This ticket will have the active support of Mr. Wilnot, M. P., and will undoubtedly carry the county.

In Westmorland a strong opposition ticket has been named. The candidates are Messrs. Powell, of Sackville, Melanson, of Shediac, Wells, of Dorchester, and ex-Mayor Sumner, of Moncton. The government combination is not meeting with much encouragement and it is altogether probable that Mr. Richard's reign as Solicitor General will be of short duration.
