#### DIRECT TAXATION.

The Gazette is the only newspaper in the city of St. John recognized as a local government organ. Its views may therefore be taken as representing those of Mr. Blair and his government. In view of this fact, its utterances on the subject of direct taxation will be read with a feeling of alarm by electors of "rural" constituencies. It acknowledges that a murmur has gone forth concerning the direct tax bill of last session, and cannot understand why so "great a hue and cry has been raised throughout the province against direct taxation " The Gazette evidently believes that the system is entirely correct and believes in carrying it further. It calls attention to the fact that the city ofSt John maintains its streets, and asks "why, then, should the people who reside in the rural districts enjoy immunity from expenditure which people living in the city are compelled to make ?" The Gazette's. utterances are doubtless inspired by the government, and it is safe to arrive at the conclusion that Mr. Blair intends continuing his policy of unloading on the different municipalities throughout the province the burdens which have heretofore been borne by the province. Ever since confederation our bridges have been built and supported by funds from the provincial treasury. Now, for the first time, we hear of a proposal to discontinue this support and allow each county to provide for itself in this respect. If we are not very much mistaken, the electors of Kent will, on the 22nd instant, set the seal of their disapproval on such a proposal by returning Messrs. Phinney and Gogain.
