

of the Municipality, by which no person is allowed to appear in the streets after nine o'clock in the evening; only persons in office returning from their bureaux, physicians visiting their patients, and messengers sent to apothecaries, are excepted.

Marshal Paskewitch had given to Warsaw fifteen days to surrender. The fatal term was to expire on the 7th inst. Five days before the expiration of the term, Paskewitch repeated his summons. No answer having been given, and the investment of the city having been completed, fresh propositions were made, which the Polish army refused to accept. On the morning of the 7th the combat commenced with the utmost obstinacy. The Poles were successively dislodged from their entrenchments, the fosses of which were filled up by the assailants with dead bodies. On the morning of the 8th, the Polish army offered to accept the conditions proffered the day before, but the Russian General no longer thought proper to grant them, and the battle recommenced. The Polish troops then quitted Warsaw and retired in a mass upon the Plozk road, being pursued and harassed by the Russians. As soon as they had quitted the city, the inhabitants opened the gates, and went out to meet the Russians. The Grand Duke Michael entered at the head of the Imperial Guards into Warsaw where no disorders took place.

FRANCE.—The news of the fall of Warsaw, has been the signal for another disturbance in the already distracted capital of France. On Saturday week the public symptoms were those of great uneasiness. The Palais Royal, the usual rendezvous on these occasions, was crowded by persons, all ready and willing to vent their disapprobation in the hearing of the King; his ministers were reviled and scorned; Sebastiani, and Casimir Perier, were hanged in effigy; the shops were closed, and once more the military were called into action to disperse the animated citizens. Two of the French Journals appeared encircled with a black border, and terminated in these words—'Patriots of France! it is no longer tears, but force and union which the revolution require of you. Poland has been betrayed by our ministers, let it be proclaimed before the face of Europe, that in so doing they have betrayed France.'

On the subject of the cholera, alarm is beginning to be seriously felt in Paris.

We received last night the Parish papers of Thursday and Friday. The streets still continued quiet, but the Chamber was becoming every hour more disorderly; and the discussion which began upon abstract points of foreign and domestic policy, had blown a perfect hurricane of vituperation, personality, and low abuse, between the present and late Ministry and the Opposition.

GREECE.—By news from Malta we have been informed that in consequence of a dispute between Admiral Moush and the President of Greece, the former had taken possession of the whole of the Greek fleet, and conveyed it to Poros. The President employed some Russian men of war to go in pursuit of the Greek fleet, and on their entering Poros, the forts opened fire, but Moush finding the Russians likely to prove victorious, set fire to all the ships, and completely destroyed the whole fleet; the crews made their escape in boats.

A letter from Napoli di Romania says—'The pillage of Poros, 24 hours after its submission, by the Greek troops, is a disgrace from which they will not easily clear themselves. It is a deplorable page in the history of modern Greece.'

CONSTANTINOPLE.—Accounts from Constantinople state, that the losses caused by the conflagration of Pera, amount to £6,000,000 sterling.

RUSSIA.—Letters received from St. Petersburg this morning, of the 21st August, old style, state that a dreadful storm from the southwest raged in and near St. Petersburg, and a part of the town was inundated but the warehouses, as well as the custom house, escaped from being damaged. Many ships received damage. There were only eleven persons sick of the cholera morbus, three recovered and three died.

BRITAIN.—The French troops are to evacuate Belgium immediately; and in the conference to determine what forts are to be demolished, France is to have no voice. The Chambers have assembled at Brussels,

and Leopold is still popular. The Duke of Orleans and General Gerard are with him in the capital of Belgium. The national forces are to be increased to 75,000. Seven Generals and 300 officers of all ranks are to be obtained from France. The militia from 1820 to 1831 to be called out, and 100 pieces of cannon to be got ready by the 30th of the present month.

AUSTRIA.—The progress of the cholera in Hungary is terrible; but as yet it had made no considerable progress at Berlin. A few only had been ill; perhaps it was only a false alarm.
