JAMAICA.—By late advices from Jamaica, we lament to state that the spirit of opposition to the acts of the mother country is no way diminished. Public meetings continue to take place, and hostile resolutions continue to be adopted. The people of the parish of Clarendon have gone a step further and seem to indicate, by calling for a permanent establishment of Militia, a disposition to form a military force to resist the King's authority.

Resolved. That it appears from authentic sources, that it is in the contemplation of the present British Ministry to virtually deprive us of our lawful possessions, by a series of fiscal regulations on the produce of our labour in order to compel us if possible, to surrender our slave property, lawfully acquired to the theoretical schemes of our avowed enemies.

Resolved. That we are determined, under no pretext whatever, ever to be the voluntary agents for the destruction of the rights, properties, and privileges of ourselves and posterity who are Britons! and consider it a sacred trust, imposed upon us to defend them to the last.

Resolved. That being actuated by such truly patriotic and constitutional feelings, we will fearlessly step forward in the hour of danger, and manifest to the world, that we will at least, not be sacrificed like a lamb led to slaughter, without an attempt to defend and uphold our just rights, lives, and properties.

Resolved. That in furtherance of these views our Representatives in Assembly be requested to support any measure brought forth, for the establishment in each parish of a permanent militia: and that we will cheerfully, not only do our duty therein, but contribute to their maintenance.

When in an evil hour, Lord Althorpe threatened in the House of Commons to punish those Islands with extra taxation which should resist the mandate of the government, he, we would hope, little contemplated the spirit in which it would be received. Let him then recall that fatal threat, and let his party go back to the principles of honour and fair dealing, or British blood will ere long be spilt by the hands of Britons—let him remember that the sin of slavery, cursed as it is, cannot be atoned for by robbery. We say that the British people do not understand this question, or so much injustice would not mark its course. We have much reliance on the honesty and good feelings of the King—he has been in the West Indies and knows the nature of the question; he was there, by Nelson, taught the value and importance of the British Colonies. We therefore entreat our West India friends to do no thing rashly.

We are unwilling to advert to the trouble in the Bahamas. The House of Assembly is at open war with the Governor; Major-General Carmichael Smith, and have petitioned His Majesty for his removal.—This difficulty springs originally from the same source, slavery and the desire manifested by certain persons in England to give emancipation to the negroes without compensation to their owners.

QUEBEC.—The Canadian of Saturday last says that a coach drawn by four horses, has arrived at Point Levy, by the Kennebec Road, and that some Americans have leased Mr McKenzie's Tavern there with a view of establishing a Line of Stages, to run regularly between Quebec and Boston. These people will also establish an intermediate house at the Beauce for the accommodation of travellers.

Among the improvements which are gradually introducing themselves into this Province, we are happy to learn that Mr. Stayner, Deputy Post Master General is taking steps to establish a weekly communication, by post, with Rimouski and Father Point, being upwards of 30 leagues farther down than any existing communication by post, among the populous and thriving settlements on the south side of the St. Lawrence. This communication will greatly tend to accelerate the progress of that part of the country, and will afford a more ready correspondence with Quebec, from the vessels taking and putting ashore pilots at Father Point, below which pilots are not wanted. It is said that a communication, by post, to Portau Saumon, below Malbie will also be established as soon as the road lately opened by legislative aid is reported practicable at all seasons. By these two lines of post, nearly 40,000 inhabitants will have the benefit of a regular and sure communication with Quebec. We understand that applications are also making for a line of post to the settlements on

Chaudiere and Kennebec road. A line is now in operation from Quebec to Sorel on the south shore.—Quebec paper.
