ceeding value of the Fisheries) we would submit, that the wisdom of defending this branch of trade, by such enactments as are calculated so to regulate its prosecution, as to render it advantageous to those immediately embarked therein, and to subserve the general interests of the country, can aeither admit of question or controversy. The extensive sea board of this Province, abounds with the most valuable kinds of fish, which form by much the more important article of Colonial exportation, and nevertheiess it is passing strange, that so little legislative pains have been bestowed upon the management, direction, or encouragement of this fruitful source of commercial activity and common good. Some feeble attempts were indeed made to foster the Cod Fishery, while the take of Herring and Mackerelwas either entirely overlooked, or abandoned to the projects of individual speculation. It is not however our intention of present, to point out all the evil effects of the present system, if that can be called a system which is neither regulated or enforced by legal authority; our object now rather is to stir up a spirit of investigation, which may possibly lead to beneficial results.—Picton Observer.

W. with the most terrific violence. Several vessels both from Halifax and the fishing ground, being anxiously expected, much apprehension was of course entertained on their account, exposed as they were considered to be, to all the dangers of a parrow rocky strait, during a most tempestuous night. That these were not unfounded, is proved by the Stranding during the storm of the schrs. Glasgow, from Halifax, with goods, at Bailey's Brook; of the Maria from Crow Harbour, with fish, on Merigomishe Island, and of a small schooner at Tony River, be longing to P. E. Island. The crews of all these vessels happily escaped; but we regret to state, that a young woman who accompanied her father to the fishing station, in the Marie, was by the waves washed out of his arms, and perished. We have not heard of any farther losses along the coast, but we fear they must be greater than we have yet been able to learn; while as regards vessels destined for this port, which were in the gulph on the night of Monday, there is every reason to believe that they bore away for the Gut, and are in safety. The stranded vessels were driven on shore from their sails having given way.

The Schr. Marie, Boudrot, Master, from Fox Island, and Crow Harbour, laden with fish, was driven on shore at Merrigomishe in the gale of Monday the 5th, and went to pieces.
