AN AGITATOR'S ADDRESS.

People of England, you are well aware that the house of jords have hitherto had the honse of commons (that which should be your house of commons) in their pockets. ST. JOHN.—The late severe weather has been a subject of very general complaint throughout this Province and the neighbouring States. In this city, during the week, the Thermometer had been down to 7 below Zero.—Several vessels which sailed bence for the out ports in Charlotte County, have, we understand, been unable to complete their loading in consequence of the navigation in the rivers being impeded by ice. The change of wind which took place vesterday, and the mild weather which has succeeded; will, we hope, obviate this difficulty.

Two or three coasing vessels are reported to have been lost in the Bay of Fondy, and the crew of one of them is said to have perished. We have not been able to obtain any particulars.

SHIPPING INTELLIGENCE.

HALIPAX.—The brig Sir P. Maitland, of this port, Lewis Johnston, Master, belonging to Mess. E. Collins & co., on entering the harbour on Saturday evening last, during a heavy gale, unfortunately went ashore on the southern side of Thrump cap Shoal. The cargo and part of the materials are saved, but the vessel, it is feared, will be lost, as she now lies in a dangerous situation. She had no cargo of consequence on board.

The schooner Penrith, from this port bound to Miramichi, was driven on shore at Plaister cove on the 5th inst. crew and cargo

There has also been a large vessel driven on shore near cape North, laden with timber, with sails and materials all on board; particulars unknown.

Also the loss of the schooner Relief, capt. Ellisou, from Halj-fax, bound to Quebec, with a cargo consisting of Rum, Brandy and pickled fish, a few miles to the westward of this place; crew and materials saved, vessel totally lost.

To the Independent Electors of the County of Gaspe. Gentlemen. - You will learn probably without surprise that you are again excluded from your just share in the representation of the Province; and that you will shortly have once more to pronounce your sense of the measure. I did not reach Quebec in time to claim my seat at the opening of the Legislature, which, both in pursuance to your injunctions, and my own sense of duty, I would it in time, punctually have done, at the first sitting of the House.

On my arrival here, the third day of the Session. learst the little value placed on your franchises and that your suffrages had been set aside by a majority of Fourteen, a measure tantamount to a declaration that you are not to be represented in the Assembly unless upon terms rendering your exclusion preferable to a participation in it, that is to say, of giving up your own opinions, and your rights in the choice of your Representative, and submitting to its dictates as if un able to judge for yourselves.

In accordance with my declaration to you previous to the last Election, I repeat that I have no wish for a seat in the Assembly, and that your decision whether I am again to return to it, or retire, will be alike satisfactory to me. But to shrink from re-appearing before you, would be to acquiese in measures deeply in-trenching upon your constitutional rights, and an admission of the misconduct undeservingly imputed to me as the cause of them.

I have never, as it is pretended, put in question the freedom of debate in the Assembly, nor controlled it. If anything in the shape of proof is to be found in the Journals of the Assembly that can bear such an interpretation, let it be remembered that it was received in a private manner, without any participation on my part by a Special Committee of the Assembly, from witnesses, whem, although petitioning for it as a matter of right, I was refused the privilege of examining in explanation, openly and publicly at the Bar of the Assembly before the whole House and the Public .- The value of such a proof and the conclusions drawn from it, you have already appreciated. It, as well as my petition, for a hearing and a public examination of the witnesses at the Bar of the House, are on the Journals and speak for themselves.

Under these circumstances and after all that has occurred, I cannot without betraying my duty to you, and avowing myself unworthy of your past confidence, refrain from submitting myself anew to your judgment. It is for you Gentlemen, as my constituents, to pronounce upon my conduct, and upon the pretensions of those who without bearing—without allowing themselves to hear any thing in explanation, have nevertheless judged of it; and I must, whatever offence it may give, address you on the subject, with the freedom which in the discussion of our rights belongs to it. It remains with you to decide whether you will be put down by force, or persevere in defending your elective franchises and constitutional rights with a determination equal to that which is evinced to deprive you of You are to reconsider the course you have taken, and if wrong, frankly condemn it by retracing your steps,—but if convinced that the position you have taken is constitutional—a necessary stand against arbitrary and overbearing measures, you have no need of advice for persevering in the line by which the Saved.

Picrou.—The brig Maria, of Greenock, M'Leod, from Quebec laden with Timber and Ashes, was lost on the night of the 13th inst, on Brion Island, they succeeded in saving the boats, &c—The next morning the ship was not to be seen. The captain & crew together with Mr M'Lelland the owner, arrived near this place on the 21st inst in two boats, and proceeded to Arichat in a vessel.
