other instances of the system of terror and persecution, our correspondent mentions, that on the 20th, eighteen soldiers were to be shot, and four women publicly whipped through the streets. Miguel had openly evinced his contempt for the authority of the British government, placing all the persons who were dismissed in consequence of the representation of our consul, in situations of greater trust and authority than those which they before filled. A press was taking place in Lisbon for the line and militia, and the forts on the Tagus are receiving additional guns, &c.

A Mr Tilstone, a surgeon, of Congleton, by way of celebrating the late coronation, had a tea party of sixty women, mothers of eight hundred and thirty-nine children! twelve of the dames alone having given birth to two hundred and two of the number—averaging 16 5-6 each!

The Glasgow and Garnkirk Railway was formally opened, on Tuesday last, in the presence of vast numbers of delighted spectators. Two locomotive engines, named the St. Rollox and the George Stephenson, have since been regularly plying on the railway.

It is a singular fact, that at Berlin the domestic fowls, ducks, and geese, and the fresh-water fish, are affected with the cholera, and die in great numbers.

Since the discovery of the New World, our English gardens have produced 2345 varieties of trees and plants from America, and upwards of 1700 from the Cape of Good Hope, in addition to many thousands which have been brought from China, the East Indies, New Holland, various parts of Africa, Asia, and Europe, until the list of plants now cultivated in this country exceeds 120,000 varieties.

The celebrated dancer, Taglioni, has sustained such injury from a sprain in the ankle, that it is not likely she will appear on the boards as a dancer.

Accounts have been received of another dreadful fire at Constantiople at the end of August, no doubt the work of incendiaries. The royal arsenal had been set fire to, but the fire was extinguished. The great destruction is at Galatea, where the valuable English warehouses are, and it is stated above 1000 of those valuable buildings have been consumed; the property destroyed is immense. The losses caused by the late conflagration at Pera have been ascertained to amount to about £6,000,000 sterling.

The plague which visited Odessa in 1812, and committed such frightful ravages, was said to have been introduced by a ring wrapped round with cotton wool, which was smuggled from the quarantine to an actress in the town.

BIRMINGHAM AND LIVERPOOL RAILWAY.—We hear that preparations are making for resuscitating this project, and that a considerable length of new line will be surveyed, with the view of materially lessening the outlay of so vast an undertaking.

THE RAILWAY.—We understand, that during the twelve months since the opening of the Manchester and Liverpool Railway, on the 15th September, 1830, there have been about 469,000 persons conveyed along the line; and that upwards of £190,000 have been received by the company for the carriage of passengers and goods.

The Courier says that the movements among the troops in Ireland are preparatory to the embarkation of several regiments for the Mediterranean and the West Indies, to relieve other regiments about to return home.

COLONIAL TRADE.—From the returns presented to the House of Commons, it appears, that the official value of the imports into the united kingdom from the British colonies and possessions, in the year ending the 5th of January, 1830, was £18,863,840. 12s 9d; that the British and Irish produce, exported to them in the same period was, in official value £15,534,882. 2s 11d, and, in declared value, £10,996,245 10s 10d. The foreign and colonial merchandise, exported to our colonies and possessions from the united kingdom, during that year, was, in official value, £1,765,078. 17s. 1d.

IRON TRADE.—Such is the ruinous depression in this branch of manufacture at the present time, that pig iron, which cannot be sold at less than 4l. per ton so as to remunerate the manufacturer, may now be bought at 2l. 10s. per ton!

PR. ED ISLAND.—The Right Reverend Dr. M'Eachern, Roman Catholic Bishop of Charlotte-Town and New-Brunswick, sailed on Tuesday last for Pictou, from whence he proceeds by way of Halifax to St. John, where, we understand his Episcopal duties will require him to reside during the winter.

QUEBEC.—Godfroi Beaudet, Esquire, Member for the county of Vaudreuil, has, we learn, voluntarily resigned his seat in the Assembly, in consequence of having become accountable for public monies.

We understand that Mr Stayner, the Deputy Post Master General, has concluded arrangements to send the Mail weekly as far as Rimouski, on the South Shore of the St. Lawrence, a courier starting from St. Andro, every Wednesday, on the arrival of the New-Brunswick courier, and returning on Saturday in time to deliver his letters on the return of the same courier on his way to Quebec. Post Masters have been appointed on this new route, and the courier will commence running next week.

Agricultural report for October, 1831.

District of Quebec.

The first part of this month continued rainy, with very little frost: On the night of the 10th, after a heavy rain, there fell several inches of snow, which disappeared in two days. The remainder of the month was fair, with only two days rain; on the 23d the thermometer was at 70 of fahrenheit.

From the setting in of the fine weather on the 12th, much diligence was employed in raising the potatoe crops, which had been retarded by the previous rains. The crop is not abundant, and many of them are injured, by being long immersed in water, and are in danger of rotting. Turnips have also been injured.

Ploughing has been much retarded in low lands, by the wetness of the ground, and the weather has again set in rainy.

The cattle still find sufficient food in the fields, but they are not in such good condition as might have been expected from the state of the pastures.

The parts of the grain crops threshed out, are less productive than was expected. Oats prove very inferior, and have greatly risen in the market.

The intelligence from England of the abundance of the wheat crops there, has put an end to purchases for exportation, and the home consumption will hardly occasion a rise in price.

Quebec, 31st October, 1831.

The Meeting of the Quebec and Halifax Steam Navigation Company, which took place to-day, to take into consideration the subject of sending the Royal William to England, adjourned sine die without reporting.

The official returns of the Customs, up to this day, make the number of arrivals 1016, tons 261.212.

The weather has been unsettled for the two last weeks, and damp and cold easterly winds have prevailed. Last night there fell a little snow, which has however disappeared. Yesterday morning, the hills to the northward of the city, were completely covered with snow.

ST JOHN.—STEAM-BOAT HENRIETTA.—This superior Boat, under the command of Capt. Wiley, an experienced Pilot, has, with every prospect of success, commenced her voyagings in our noble Bay. She has been completed with a dispatch to the highest degree praiseworthy to all concerned, only 27 days having elapsed since the foundation stone of her machinery was laid down. She started in fine style on Friday morning last: on her first trip to Digby and Annapolis. A better opportunity of proving her prowess could not have been selected, a heavy gale from the S. E. with its usual swell, having just set in, and Capt Wiley states that in all the time he has navigated the Bay, he has scarcely ever experienced more unfavorable weather; the spray, from the velocity of the Boat forcing her way thro' a head sea, was frequently dashed to a distance above the pipe, which is 40 feet high. The Engineer who came out from England with the machinery and who has been employed on board steam boats in the English Channel, says he never was on board a boat which worked with greater ease, or stood the sea better: and she has thus proved herself to possess the desirable quality of being a good sea boat.

MELANCHOLY ACCIDENT.—On Sunday evening, 30th ult. at Jemseg, Mr Henry Harvey, Superintendent of the Grand Lake Coal Mines, who was on his return from Fredericton with a wood boat load of coal, came out of the cabin of the boat, and fell into the hold. Although assistance was promptly obtained and he was speedily bled, he spoke but a few words, remained insensible, and in a few hours he expired. His daughter, a young woman, was with him on board of the boat at the time. Mr H. has left a wife and three children.
