

that place is 3500—their exports of fish, oil, &c. amounts to 1,100,000 sterling.—They own 92 registered vessels, measuring 6,487 tons, engaged in the Seal and Cod fisheries; the Town has doubled in wealth and population during 20 years—and yet the people have no power to make a single municipal regulation for the protection of their fisheries and trade, or for the preservation of their property from fire! One of the speakers, at this meeting, in referring to the rapid advancement of this Province under a Legislative system, observed that 'Nova Scotia was yearly sending to Newfoundland, men whose ambition it was to legislate for the Island.' His Excellency Sir Thomas Cochrane sailed for England, on the 5th inst. in the Foite.

P. E. ISLAND.—Mr. Nelson has been returned for Queen's County, to fill the vacancy occasioned by the death of Ewen Cameron, Esq. The Charlotte-Town races took place on the 5th, and for three days furnished a great deal of amusement. The Chiefs of the Micmac Indians presented a respectful address to Governor Ready, previous to his departure, and paid a similar compliment to Governor Young on his arrival.

On Friday, His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor held his first Levee at Government House. The attendance was the most numerous we ever recollect to have seen on any similar occasion. The gentlemen present were severally introduced to His Excellency by the late Lieutenant Governor.

BERMUDA.—The legislature of these Islands having been promptly called together in a special Session, his Excellency Sir Millgrove Turner acquainted both Houses with the deplorable situation to which their fellow Colonists in Barbadoes had been reduced, and suggested the propriety of sending immediate relief. The subject was taken up, and £1000 generously voted for the alleviation of the distresses of the Barbadians. The Revenue of Nova Scotia is about ten times greater than that of Bermuda; the prosperity we are enjoying, compared with that of those Islands, is of a more solid and less questionable character, and we yet cannot spare a few hundred pounds to mitigate the evils of one of the most awful visitations of Providence that has ever occurred in the Colonies. A contemporary furnishes a lame excuse for this apathy, when he supposes that only the rich have suffered by the storm. We knew of no mark which the poor affix to their dwellings when the destroying tempest passes over their heads; all classes have suffered, and although a few may have the means of recovery from such a stroke of fortune, hundreds have been reduced to the extremity of distress.—*Nova Scotian*.

We copy the following notice respecting the Light House on Anticosti, from the Quebec papers, for the information of nautical men:—

A Light House having been erected on the Southwest point of the Island of Anticosti, notice is hereby given that a grand revolving light, on the Argand principle, was shewn thereon for the first time, on the 25th August last; and that the said light will continue to be shewn every night from sun-set to sun-rise, from the 25th day of March to the last day of December, in each year.

When ships are to the eastward of the Light House, they may safely stand toward the Island until it bears N. N. W. by compass; they will then be in a good fair way; and if they wish to make more free with the land, they can do so by their leads. The land trending from the Light House S E by S., or nearly so.

When ships are to the westward of the Light House, they may safely stand towards the Island until the light bears S. S. E. 1-2 E.; they will then be in a good fair way from the land, and, as before mentioned, they can make more free by the lead.

Nearly east and west with the Light House, and about 3-4 of a mile from it, is the outermost part of the reef of rocks, which joins the S. W. point. These are dry at low water, and are the only danger near the Light House; therefore a birth of a mile from the point is a good fair way.

Sixteen leagues to the eastward of the Light House at Shallop Creek, and sixteen leagues to the Westward of the Light House at Grand Bay, and at the Light House itself, are depots of provisions for the use of mariners in distress, or other shipwrecked persons.
