HALIFAX.—We are deeply concerned to state that on Sunday evening last, one of the Dartmouth Ferry Boats was oversel, and a number of Persons drowned.

The Boat was under the charge of a man of the name of Cosily—he had rece ved on board upwards of Thirty Passens be had gone but a few yards from the Wharf, when it was neticed by persons on shore that she was greatly overloaded, and another Ferry Boat pushed off, and took from her ten or eleven of the Passenger's, in opposition to Costley's Wishes. The wind was N. W. and light, the sail of the Boat was mostly brailed up, and she was rowed with four oais. At hait-past eight o'clock then m'd-way between the sides of the Harbour, it came on to rain heavily, attended by wind—a sea rtruck the Boat, which careened her, and was, in the ustant, succeeded by a violent squall, which threw her on her beam ends, when she filled, and sunk some little distance—in a few moments she rose to the surface, at which time six Persons were clinging to her and one to the mast—the latter however soon lost his hold and was drowned. Among those drowned, were Costley and his Assistant, Mrs. Murphy, Messrs. Hennessy, Brothers, Leahy, Kenny, Ready, Riley and Barry, and two Seamen, whose names we have not heard.

We much lear, from what we have been told respecting this melancholy event, that Costley and several of the Passengers were in a state of intoxication. At this season of the year, and in fine weather, a latge number of Persons visit Darkmouth, and the Canal Works, every Sunday afternoon—many of whom remain till after dara, and some indulge in excessive drinking. It therefore behoves the Magistrates to take care, that, in future, the Ferry Boats are of a proper size and description—that they are limited to a certain number of Passengers—and that the persons employed in them are of sober, temperate habits, and, in every respect, capable of doing their duty.

TRADE AND SHIPPING OF CAPE-BRETON,—The greater number of the vessels owned in this Island, being occupied in the fisheries, it follows that a mere statement of such as are entered and cleared at the Custom House during the year; (being those only engaged in trade to and from other ports,) would convey but an inadequate idea of the real amount of Shipping, employed in Cape Breion: yet, as such a statement may be of use in forming a comparative estimate, between the trade of this Island, and of other ports, in the Province, the following is offered and may be depended on as accurate, so far as it sees. so far as it goes.

It is a fact, worth noticing, for the instruction of the pro-vincial legislators, that this Island of Cape Breton, which one honorable member of the honorable House of Assembly wished at the bottom of the sea. before Nova Scotia had been troubled with such an appendage, and in reference to which, another honorable member 'hoped no more such islands would be annexed to Nova Scotia,'—that this same Island so ungraciously admitted as part and parcel of the Province, paid into the Treasury a revenue, on articles consumed in the Island, but printipally imported throughout Halifax, amounting to £8.472 exclusive of £3,000 per annum, sterling, arising from the rent of the Coal Mines, and divided among the provincial officers at Halifax. Be it further noted that tea thousand tons of spipping have been this year contracted for with one Mercantile house alone, at Halifax, to export coals from Cepe Breton to foreign ports, the production of the Mining Company being so last encreasing, that the coasters and Americans no longer suffice for the trade. Arrangements are making to load ships of 5 or 600 hundred tons burthen in two days, at a secure harbour, a short distance above the Mines, where a yard and wharf have been constructed.
