

SCOTLAND.—On Thursday week, the Lord Advocate was returned for the Forfar district of burghs, he having the votes of Dundee, Perth, and St. Andrews. The Honourable Captain Ogilvy had those of Forfar and Cupar. On Friday the Lord Advocate returned from his election, and a cavalcade of 2000 men walked out to meet and congratulate his lordship; and he was escorted through the town, amidst the most enthusiastic cheers, mingled with the shouts of 'Jeffrey for ever!'

HENRY MACKENZIE, Esq.—We regret to announce the death of this eminent literary character and venerable citizen, so well known as the author of 'The Man of Feeling, and many other productions. Mr. Mackenzie was in his 86th year, having been born in 1745.—His eldest son is Lord Mackenzie, at present an eminent Judge in the Courts of Session and Judiciary.—Edinburgh Courant.

IRELAND. DUBLIN, Jan. 31.—The city has been the whole morning in a state of the greatest ferment and excitement, in consequence of the 'Trades,' as they are called, accompanied by the whole rabble of the metropolis, being in progress towards the agitator's residence, in Merrion-square. There has been no proclamation issued for preventing the assemblage of this frightful mob; nor are we aware that the government or the magistrates contemplate any measures for preventing or dispersing the meeting. It appears to us strange—not being in the secrets of the executive, that that which was proclaimed some short time since as dangerous to public peace, should this day be considered as innocuous. We hope there is no wavering, no vacillating—above all, we hope there is to be no conciliation. Lord Anglesey is standing on the very brink of a precipice—one false step might prove destruction to himself and to the country. A notice was served upon Mr O'Connell this afternoon, intimating to him, on the part of the crown, that his attendance in court would be required from day to day pending the proceedings. Should he disregard the notice, and proceed to England, it is, we understand, the intention of the Attorney General to apply to have his recognisances estreated.

On the 28th January, the Bankers and Merchants of Dublin presented their loyal address to the Lord Lieutenant—About 400 gentlemen proceeded in carriages from the Royal Hotel, College Green, to the Castle. When the address was handed to the Earl of Anglesey, he placed his hand upon his heart and said, "this is one of the proudest days of my life." On the same day the Lord Lieutenant held his first levee, at which there were 591 presentations. The Assemblage is described as the most respectable and influential that has been held for 20 years in the Court of an Irish Viceroy.

ENGLAND. The public were anxiously looking forward to the re-opening of Parliament, which was to take place on the 3rd Feb. The Morning Chronicle of January 31st, says that "Nothing is yet known of the Ministerial Plan of Reform, whatever some people pretend. In fact, the Plan was only yesterday forwarded to His Majesty at Brighton; and, till His Majesty's pleasure be known with respect to it nothing can be known by the public."

Subscriptions for the benefit of the Poles are announced in several of the London papers.

State of the Country.—Burning still continued in various parts of the country. A letter from Dover, of the 30th January, mentions that on the previous night two barns, filled with grain, were destroyed, near Lord Guilford's residence.

The Hampshire Chronicle notices several incendiary acts in that county. The Shrewsbury Chronicle mentions the burning of several stacks of hay and grain in that section of country. The village of Winbon, near Wolverhampton, has been the scene of several fires. We copy the following from the Liverpool Courier, of Feb 2:

Norfolk.—During the past week the portion of this county called Marshland, which had hitherto been exempt from such calamities, has been the scene of no less than three instances of the destruction of property by incendiaries.

POLAND.—We have nothing direct from Poland. Russia was preparing all her strength to crush the insurgents, and they in turn were preparing to receive them. The Commissioners sent to St. Petersburg returned with despatches, and with memoranda of

their conversation with the Emperor. Count Diebitsch had joined the army.

There appears little doubt that, if all efforts at pacification and adjustment should fail, the Grand Army will attempt to throw itself across the Vistula at Joponna between Warsaw and Modlin, so as to operate on the left bank, and cut off the communications by the great roads of Lowicz and Rawa. A second corps and the grand reserve will penetrate by Minsk so as to mask Prega; whilst a third will move on the Warwoships to the South. Nearly 80,000 men, with an immense field train, are advancing towards Southern Poland.

AMATEUR THEATRE.—On Tuesday evening last, the Amateurs performed Dr. Goldsmith's admired Comedy of SHE STOOPS TO CONQUER, with the laughable Farce of RAISING THE WIND. The house was well filled, and the evening's entertainment gave general satisfaction.
