welfare and good Government of the Netherlands, and with the future security of other states. Appearances of timult and disorder have produced unearness in different parts of Europe; but the as-surances of a friendly dispession, which I continue to receive from all Foreign Powers, justify the expec-tation that I shall be enabled to preserve for my prople the blessings of pears. Impressed at all times with the necessity of respec-ting the faith of national engagements, I am pursuaded that my determination to maintain, in conjunction with

ting the faith of national engagements. I am pursuaded that my determination to maintain, in conjunction with my Allies, these general treaties by which the peliti-cal system of Europe has been established, will offer the best security for the repose of the world. I have not yet accredited my Ambassador to the Court of Lisbon; but the Portuguese Government have determined to perform a great act of justice and humanity, by the grant of a general annesty, I think that the time may shortly arrive when the interests of my subjects will demand a renewal of these relations which had so long existed between the two coun-tries. tries.

I am impelled, by the deep solicitade which I feel for the welfare of my people, to recommend to yea your immediate can ideration the provisions which it may be adviseable to make for the exercise of the royal authority, in case that if should please Almighty God to terminate my life before my successor shall have

arrived at years of maturity. I shall be prepared to concur with you in the ad option of these measures which may appear best calcula ed to maintain unimpaired the stability and dignly of the Crown, and thereby to strengthen the securities by which the civil and religious liberties of my people are guarded.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons. I have ordered the estimates of those services of the present year for which the last Parliament did not fully provide, to be forthwith laid before you. The estimates for the ensuing year will be prepared with that strict regard to economy which I am determined to enforce in every branch of the public Expenditure.

By the demise of my lamented brother, the late King, the Civil List Revenne has expired.

I place, without reserve, at your disposal, my interests in the hereditary revenues, and in these funds which may be derived from any Droits of the Crown or Admiralty, from the West India Duties, or from any casual revenues either in my foreign possessions or in the United Kingdom

In surrendering to you my interests in the Revenues which have in former settlements of the Civil List been reserved to the Grown. I rejoice in the opportunity of evincing my entire reliance on your dutiful attach-ment, and my confidence that you will cheerfully pro-vide all that may be necessary for the support of the eivil government, and the honour and dignity of my Crown

## My Lords and Gentlemen,

I deeply lament that in some districts of the country the property of my subjects has been endangered by combinations for the destruction of machinery; and that serious losses have been sustained through the acts of wicked uncendiaries

I cannot view without grief and indignation, the efforts which are industriously made to excite among my people a spirit of discontent and disaff ction, and to disturb the concord which happily prevails between those parts of my dominions, the Union of which is essential to their common strength and common happiness.

I am determined to exert, to the utmost of my pow er, all the means which the Law and the Constitution have placed at my disposal, for the punishment of andition, and for the prompt suppression of outrage aud disorder

Amidst all the difficulties of the present conjuncture I reflect with the highest satisfaction on the loyalty and effectionate attachment of the great body of my people.

I am confident that they justly appreciate the full advantage of that happy form of Government under which, through the favor of Divine Providence, this country has enjoyed, for a long succession of years, a greater share of internal peace, of commercial prosperity, of true liberty, of all that constitutes social happiness, than has fallen to the lot of any other country in the world. It is the great object of my life to preserve these blessings to my people, and to transmit them un-impaired to posterity; and I am animated in the dis-
