

diate vicinity of Halifax. The heat was intense on Sunday, and on Monday it was almost intolerable. The Thermometer stood at 99 in the shade, and on board a brig lying at Collins' wharf, it was 117 in the sun. There was a difference of 50 degrees between the temperature of the air, and of the salt water in the harbor. Yesterday it was much cooler, and there was a pleasant breeze from the westward.

RASBERRIES were in market on Tuesday. Ripe Blue Berries have been picked on the Peninsula during the week, and our Cherries are following the good example set them by Dr. McCulloch's, and are blushing beautifully. There will be a heavy yield of grass upon the Peninsula—we have scarcely seen a field where it is not abundant. The scythe and rake are in full employment.

NEW ANNAH, June 22—On Sunday last, during Divine Service, in the place of worship here, three boys sitting beside the stove, were struck by lightning; one of them complained of a violent pain in the back part of his head, but soon recovered.—Patriot.

ST ANDREWS—We regret to state that the double Saw Mill, lately erected by John Wilson, Esq. at Chamcook, was totally destroyed on Monday last. The pond being filled with an immense body of water to the depth of fifteen feet, caused so great a pressure, that the perpendicular dam, built of stone and wood, suddenly burst, and in an instant every part of the Mill and Dam were precipitated into the salt water—not a vestige of the establishment remaining on or near the premises.

Three men were in the Mill at the time; one of them fell among the ruins, in which he was entangled, while it was carried down a stream of water a mile before he could get his head above water—when they were all Providentially rescued from what appeared inevitable destruction, by a boat coming to their assistance. This mill had only been in operation a few days, and we fear the loss of it will be attended with serious inconvenience to the enterprising proprietor, who is building a very large ship in the immediate vicinity of where it stood.

ST. JOHN.—The following fines were inflicted by the Court on the Captain named in our last, as being convicted of a breach of the Passenger Law:—Captain Risk, 30l. Elder, 29l. McCaskey, 20l.

On Saturday last, three cases small pox, in the family of one emigrant, residing in the Lower Cove, were reported. A meeting of the Magistrates was immediately called to deliberate on the steps necessary to be taken relative thereto; and measures were adopted for the immediate removal of the infected family to Patridge Island. Although there is no serious cause of apprehension that the disorder will spread in the City, yet we would strongly urge upon the heads of families, immediate attention to vaccination. This duty they owe not only to the preservation of their children, but also to the community.

FREDERICTON—The Annuaire at King's College, Fredericton, was celebrated during the last week. On Sunday June 26th, the Venerable Archdeacon Custer preached the Annual Sermon before the University. The Tuesday and Wednesday were occupied with the Examination of the Collegiate and Collegiate School. A Convocation was held on Thursday, when the Rev. Dr. Jacob pronounced the Annual Oration commemorative of the Founders and Benefactors of the University, and Mr Henry Smith recited his Essay on the character of King Alfred, for which he received the Douglas Gold Medal. The Silver Medal was awarded to Mr. Francis Stratton, who appeared at the head of the first Class of the School.

CANADA. MELANCHOLY OCCURRENCE—The Canada papers contain intelligence of the death of Mr. Z. Mudge, Private Secretary to His Excellency Lieutenant Governor Sir J. Colborne. The following particulars of the event are given in the Herald of the 15th June, published at Kingston, in a letter from a correspondent at New York:

"I am just returned from seeing the body, and I now regret that I ever looked at it. He dined as usual at the Government House—returned home and went to bed, and even put out his light, for the candlestick was near his bed's head with the extinguisher upon it. He used his rifle for the purpose—lying on his back he must have taken it near the muzzle with his left hand, and with the ramrod in his right touched the trigger, the muzzle being in or near his mouth. The ramrod was in his hand when I saw him. The contents went through the upper part of the front of the head, carrying away a large portion of the upper part of the skull over the nose and left eye. His servant did not hear the report of the rifle, and therefore his masters situation was not discovered until he went up to call him about 7 o'clock on Friday morning. The only imaginable cause that I have heard mentioned is, that a relative of his lately committed suicide in England, and therefore it is thought that there has been a constitutional tendency to that unhappy state of mind which leads to this melancholy extremity.—I am just told that yesterday at dinner time and during the evening he did not appear to pay his usual attention to those who addressed him, and to the gentleman who took particular notice of his conduct he sometimes appeared hurried and talkative, and again silent and absent. I have never witnessed anything which has made so deep an impression on my mind as the remains of this unhappy young man. But yesterday he lived in youth and apparent prosperity—to-day he is a spectacle fearful to look upon, and melancholy to reflect upon." Verdict of the Coroner's Inquest, INSANITY.

Mr Mudge was a gentleman of amiable manners, and in every respect qualified for the important situation which he held. His death must be deeply regretted by all who had the pleasure of being personally acquainted with him, and a loss to the public service.

QUEBEC—The plan of a Railway, from the river Chippawa to the village of Queenston, where the navigation of Lake Ontario terminates, for the purpose of forming a communication between that Lake and Lake Erie, has been at length taken up. The Colonial Advocate says "the proprietors of stock in this intended railroad, have subscribed £300, and called for the assistance of a

practical Engineer from the Baltimore Rail way. Messrs. Clark and Street have taken an active part in the undertaking." There is now rather an after thought, had such a rail-road been set on foot, when the Welland Canal was first projected it would, ere this, have paid the proprietors, and brought back the carrying trade to the Niagara Frontier. The Welland Canal being now open, it appears to us that the rail road will be serviceable only for local purposes, and that the transport upon it will be of too limited an extent to repay even the moderate outlay such a work will require.

Showing a decrease in the import of Rum, to 14th June 1831, of 1219 puns and 65 hhds less than last year. The total number of Emigrants that have arrived at Quebec, this season, is 28,134.

NEWFOUNDLAND, June 14—HMS Gannet, Commander Sweny, sailed on Thursday last for the French Shore, for the purpose, we understand, of investigating into the nature of some disputes which are said to have recently occurred there between the British and the French fishermen.

WEST INDIES. Kingston Papers to the 8th ult, state that the Small Pox was rapidly gaining ground in that city, and extending to other parts of the Island. The brig Lady Cathcart, of Glasgow, with a full cargo of rum, sugar, coffee, &c was totally destroyed by fire in the harbor of Kingston, on the 24th May; the accident was occasioned in drawing off rum by a candle. The greatest exertions were necessary to preserve several other vessels lying near her.

Great preparations are making in New York, to celebrate the 4th July. The young men's Temperance society, and also about 100 Cartmen, petitioned the Common Council, to pass a Law to prevent the erection of Booths around the Park, on that day. A motion to that effect was made in the Council, and was lost; but an amendment was afterwards carried, to prevent the sale of Spirituous Liquors in those Booths.

An appropriation of 1,250l. was voted for the Corporation dinner. And it was moved, that as spirituous Liquors and wine had been precluded from the poor, no spirituous liquors or wine should be furnished at the Corporation dinner.

Several melancholy cases of Hydrophobia, have occurred in New York, and other parts of the United States.
