EFFECTS OF THE STORM AT MONTREAL.—The Sylph was ready for sea, and has lost her foremast and bowsprit.

The Ann & Eliza was blown from her moorings towards the batture near the Saint Norman, where she fell over on her beam sinds. She is expected to be got off with some little damage.

The Supply was carried out at the same moment to the same batture, and was there capsized; she has been since got off. Both these vessels were nearly empty. The crews were all precipitated into the water, but no lives were lost. The damage, yet mainboom, fore yard, both top gallant-masts and cross-trees, and her rigging all cut.
