Computed Emigration to Quebec in 1831. 47,000

“SYDNEY, CAPE BRETON, 30th June, 1831.”

Mr Chubb—Sir: You have probably heard of the fate of ship Aurora, bound from Liverpool to Miramichi, cast away upon St. Paul's Island at the commencement of the present season. The ship was nearly a total wreck, but the lives of the crew were preserved, except one.—I regret to state, that on the 14th inst, another more distressing case of shipwreck was discovered to have taken place but a short distance from the scene of the Aurora's destruction. The first objects that gave notice of the events were the sails of the unfortunate vessel displayed upon the cliff, where they appeared to have been dashed, together with a quantity of the rigging. Here also was found part of the stern, having on it “HERO OF LIVERPOOL,” and the cat heads, &c, which were painted green. The principal part of the hull was perceived sunk close to the shore, in five or six feet of water—the fate attending the crew, nothing whatever is known. Both these wrecks occurred on the South East side of the Island, the scene of each being separated only by a point of rocks.—At the same time that the wreck of the Hero was discovered, five bodies were found lying under a sail on the N. W. side of the Island, but it was thought, from their advanced state of decay, that they could not be the remains of any of the Hero's crew.—On the shore also was seen the wreck of a schooner, supposed to have been cast away lately.

Looking back on the arrays of shocking tragedies, continually repeated on this spot, one cannot but feel urgently impelled to do all in his power, however little it may be, towards promoting some means of arresting or alleviating these never-ending disasters.—Some of which are attended with circumstances of misery and suffering too dreadful for description. I hope therefore, you will aid the cause by inserting a notice of the late accidents in your paper. It may stimulate, to further exertions, the praiseworthy individuals who have interested themselves in procuring the aid of the two Legislatures for erecting a Light-House, as may induce them to adopt some immediate measures of precaution and relief.

It appears that the Legislatures of either Province did not come to any understanding in time to prosecute the building this season, but I would submit that a trusty person might be stationed on the Island, with a few attendants, furnished with provisions, and a shed or two, to house and protect from famine the unfortunate sufferers, until they could find means to escape from such a place.—This alone would be a great advantage and probably the means of saving many lives. The expense of this plan would not be worth a thought, and it is capable of immediate execution. It might not be done at once by the authorities in the Province of New Brunswick; and Canada would, I have no doubt, cheerfully bear her proportion until the establishment of the Light House is fairly settled by the Governments.
